ELECTRICITY INFRASTRUCTURE INVESTMENT AMENDMENT (TENDER MORATORIUM) BILL 2024

Second Reading Debate

Debate resumed from 21 June 2024.

Mr JIHAD DIB (Bankstown—Minister for Customer Service and Digital Government, Minister for Emergency Services, and Minister for Youth Justice) (10:18): As the Minister representing the Minister for Energy, I contribute to the debate on the Electricity Infrastructure Investment Amendment (Tender Moratorium) Bill 2024. The Government does not support the bill as it will slow down the delivery of the New South Wales Electricity Infrastructure Roadmap, also known as the road map, which is a strategic priority of the Government. The bill relates to the biannual tenders for long-term energy service agreements run by the New South Wales Consumer Trustee established under the Electricity Infrastructure Investment Act 2020, also known as the EII Act.

These tenders support investment, construction and operation of renewable energy generation, long-duration storage and firming infrastructure in New South Wales. If passed, the bill will prohibit the Consumer Trustee from running tenders for long-term energy service agreements until a parliamentary inquiry into the EII Act is complete. This inquiry would be required to consider site selection, impacts on agriculture and business, adequacy of regional community consultation and adequacy of related programs. An inquiry into the impact of renewable energy zones, also known as REZs, on rural and regional communities and industries in New South Wales is currently on foot and covers much of this. The Electricity Infrastructure Roadmap coordinates investment in new transmission generation, storage and firming infrastructure to ensure New South Wales has an electricity system that provides affordable, clean and reliable energy for everyone across New South Wales.

This investment will bring more renewable energy into the grid, which will put downward pressure on electricity bills. In recognition of the importance of this mission, the New South Wales Government has endorsed the road map as a strategic priority. An all-of-government effort is underway to make sure that as coal-fired power stations retire, New South Wales has enough renewable energy, transmission and storage to meet the energy needs of every household, school, hospital, farm and business across the State. The road map is enabled by the EII Act, which was passed with multi-party support. The EII Act has set legislated renewable energy and storage objectives for New South Wales to meet by 2030, and even more over time. Long-term energy service agreements are a key feature of the road map. They provide long-term certainty to incentivise investment in energy infrastructure. Regular tenders are essential to ensure that there is sufficient time to construct projects, maintain investor certainty and coordinate and underwrite investment in the infrastructure required to meet legislated minimum objectives for new renewable energy and long-duration storage.

The proposed moratorium would slow down the delivery of the energy transition and put the delivery of the road map and the minimum generation and storage objectives at risk. The Minister for Energy would also be prevented from directing the Consumer Trustee to hold a tender for firming long-term energy service agreements to address forecast breaches of the energy security target while a moratorium was in place. Timely delivery of the road map and tenders for long-term energy service agreements are, therefore, critical to ensuring that the lights stay on in New South Wales. The issues raised in the bill are already considered in the tender process, as set out in gazetted tender rules. Tender bids are assessed as high merit if they make commitments to improve regional economic development, to engage and share benefits with local communities and if they demonstrate projects will improve land use, including through opportune site selection.

The Consumer Trustee's assessment must also consider requirements of the Renewable Energy Sector Board's plan. If successful in the tender, proponent commitments become binding terms in contracts to develop the project. These matters will be further considered in the statutory review of the EII Act, due to commence in December 2025. The review is to consider whether the policy objectives of the Act remain valid and whether the terms of the Act remain appropriate for securing these objectives, which include supporting economic development and promoting local industry. A report on the review must be tabled by December 2026. For these reasons the New South Wales Government does not support the bill.

Debate adjourned.

Motions

MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

Ms DONNA DAVIS (Parramatta) (10:30): I move:

That this House:

- (1) Notes that over two in five Australians aged 16 to 85 are estimated to have experienced a mental disorder in their lifetime.
- (2) Acknowledges the Government is committed to taking meaningful action to support the mental health of the people of New South Wales.
- (3) Commends the Government's first step in this long journey by announcing a \$111.8 million package of initiatives to support community mental health and wellbeing, including three new full-time equivalent community mental health team members, and one mental health housing liaison officer.

Over two in five Australians aged 16 to 85 are estimated to have experienced a mental disorder at some point of their life, and my electorate of Parramatta is not immune to that. This sobering statistic is significant as the impacts of a mental illness are far reaching, not just on the individual but also on family and friends and on an individual's wider social circle. In the Parramatta local government area, according to the 2021 Australian Bureau of Statistics census, 5.1 per cent of residents identified as having a long-term mental health condition. That is a staggering 13,000 people. The tragic flow-on effect of severe mental illness is estimated to reduce life expectancy by nearly 16 years for men and 12 years for women.

The NSW Suicide Monitoring System notes that in 2023 approximately 934 people died by suspected or confirmed suicide in New South Wales. That is more than 2½ times the 348 deaths from road accidents in 2023 and equates to losing two to three people a day. My heart goes out to everyone that has lost a loved one, a work colleague or a friend to suicide. It is a terrible tragedy that some people experiencing mental health issues end up taking their lives. World Suicide Prevention Day was on 10 September, when global observance brings over 60 countries together, uniting us in our shared mission to promote stigma reduction, advocate for policy change, encourage people to seek help and honour the memories of those lost to suicide, and acknowledge those who have survived suicide attempts and those who bear the weight of grief. It is pleasing that the New South Wales Government is committed to doing all it possibly can to better support the mental health of people across New South Wales.

Parramatta Mission is a stronghold for providing community support in the Parramatta electorate. Twice a month it runs a homelessness hub. The reality is that many of the people supported by the hub are not facing primary or secondary homelessness; they are facing mental health issues. It is such a confronting situation that so many resources from our community organisations and non-government organisations are being thrown into providing basic everyday support to keep these people alive—literally, in many cases. While the Government has confidence in our State services, frontline clinicians and quality assurance mechanisms, there is more work to be done to ensure that our system is people-centred, recovery-oriented, trauma-informed, culturally responsive, and built with and for our community.

Upon entering government, the Minister for Mental Health immediately commissioned a gaps analysis as an initial step to understand the size of the problem and prioritise immediate actions. As such, this year's budget saw an investment of \$2.9 billion towards mental health services in New South Wales—the largest on record. This includes the new investment of \$111.8 million for boosting community mental health services, enhancing support for mental health consumers with complex needs. Of this new investment \$38.9 million will go towards establishing the mental health Single Front Door through Healthdirect. It is a statewide single point of contact for mental health care, integrated with our Federal health services. No matter what type of mental health care people require, the Government has created the central pathway to find it.

The opening of the jointly funded mental health Medicare centre, currently referred to as Head to Health, has been a success story in Parramatta. Located on George Street, the service operates seven days a week. It is accessible to anyone in the community, whether they have a Medicare card or not. That is such an important aspect of this service, because we know that mental health services need to be available to every single person in our community. So many people living in places across Western Sydney come to Parramatta to seek out services that in the past have not been affordable and accessible. Having a service jointly funded by both governments that is available seven days a week is truly a step in the right direction. Recently I was at the announcement of the opening of four more centres across New South Wales, which is truly good news for the people of this State.

The recent budget also saw an investment that added 35 senior mental health clinicians to existing teams located in key areas across New South Wales. Western Sydney, South Western Sydney, Hunter New England and South Eastern Sydney local health districts are each funded for three full-time equivalent community mental health team members, while the Mid North Coast, Murrumbidgee and Southern New South Wales local health districts each received funding for two. The Justice Health and Forensic Mental Health Network will have seven full-time employees to provide transition support and community follow-up. These initiatives are making a big difference. Complementing this is an enhanced investment in the crisis support helplines. Mental health touches people of all ages, so we are ensuring that this support is there for kids as well. I commend consideration of the motion to the House and acknowledge all the work that the New South Wales Government is doing in this space.

Ms ROBYN PRESTON (Hawkesbury) (10:37): I make a contribution to debate on the motion. I am really struggling with the motion in many ways because I feel that the mental healthcare system in New South Wales is broken. It lacks the significant funding it needs to do its work. It is failing its patients, their families, carers and friends, our broader society and even our economy. Increasingly we see people being overlooked when this current Government plans mental healthcare programs. Those in the mental healthcare workforce are underpaid and are experiencing burnout. Families are feeling under supported and are struggling with cost-of-living pressures. As the shadow Minister for Veterans as well as mental health, I am extremely conscious that the lived experiences of our veterans are disregarded and ignored.

Ageing affects all ages and people with different histories. The care needed and the carers who provide that support cannot be ignored. We must support the mental healthcare system so that generations to come are equipped with the skills needed to effectively manage their physical and mental health, as well as self-regulate their access to resources. Right now, State funding is barely keeping up with inflation. This is a huge detriment for people needing external care services, all while battling cost-of-living pressures, impacts of continuing natural disasters and the already unmet funding needs. Mental healthcare funding in New South Wales has been

devastated by a funding cut of \$57.6 million since March 2023. What happens when our youth are not provided with the tools and assistance to manage their mental health issues? Will we see a further increase in the need for aged care in the next five years, 10 years or 15 years?

Services that positively impact a person's right to physical and mental health and wellbeing are crucial in the step towards a better supported aged-care system. Carers themselves feel the weight of their career choice. We have amazing Samaritans who want to offer everything and will give all they can until they cannot anymore, but that is the problem. The recent inquiry into equity, accessibility and appropriate delivery of outpatient and community mental health care in New South Wales sat for 11 months. The report includes 17 findings and makes 39 recommendations. It found that the New South Wales system is in crisis.

Community mental health care cannot get secure funding to build sustainable organisations because the cost of running those organisations is outstripping funding and there is a lack of information sharing. Mental health care for regional and remote communities is particularly poor. Disadvantaged groups are regularly overlooked when planning mental health programs. The underpaid, burnt-out public and community workforce is unable to provide the care it wants to give to its patients, and people are leaving as a result. At the report's release, we heard from the mother of a man shot by New South Wales police while he was having an acute psychotic episode. The mother pleaded for a different approach, one led by mental health professionals. The message from mental health professionals is that the time for review is over.

The NSW Mental Health Alliance is holding the New South Wales Government to account for its inertia. The alliance includes the Australian College of Mental Health Nurses, the Australian Society for Psychological Medicine, BEING Mental Health Consumers, the Black Dog Institute, Mental Health Carers NSW, the Mental Health Coordinating Council, the Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Psychiatrists, the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners and WayAhead Mental Health Association. The alliance has demanded that the current New South Wales Government "stop playing politics and start real reform" in mental health. It calls for an immediate increase in funding, a whole-of-government reform approach, an expansion of the Safe Haven program to be available 24/7, an expansion of supported living services, mandatory training for police officers and a new approach to responding to mental health crises.

The current budget's funding allocation of \$111.8 million—which the member for Parramatta talked about—will not address the 58,000 people in New South Wales with severe and complex mental health challenges. Hidden in the \$57.6 million of funding stripped is a masked cut to the Pathways to Community Living Initiative. The original tenders from community health services included \$40 million annually, providing 230 beds for those with long-term mental health needs. The Minister acknowledges that the program will now only have \$10 million of annual funding, providing a maximum of 20 beds. We are going from 230 beds to 20 beds, yet the Labor Government is still spruiking that it is doing a fabulous job in mental healthcare funding. It is a reduction of critical mental health care by stealth. There have been 50 reviews into mental health in the past decade. It is now time for action from this New South Wales Government.

I understand that the motion was moved in good faith and that this Labor Government believes that the \$111.8 million in funding to support community mental health is the way forward, but the Government needs to do much more. The Australian Bureau of Statistics reported that there were 3,144 deaths by suicide in the Australian population in 2021; 42.9 per cent of people aged between 16 and 85 years had experienced a mental health disorder at some time in their life; and 21.5 per cent of people had a 12-month mental disorder, with anxiety being the most common. I could go on about the statistics. At the end of the day, that motion, whilst it has merit, could go much further.

Mrs SALLY QUINNELL (Camden) (10:44): I make a brief contribution to debate on the motion moved by the member for Parramatta regarding the incredible challenge that is mental illness. The motion notes that over two in five Australians aged 16 to 85 are estimated to have experienced a mental disorder in their lifetime. However, that does not describe the impact that it has, nor the devastation of families and friends in our communities. It is an issue in every part of the State, no matter the socio-economic status or profile of the area. In Camden, I speak with people weekly who are struggling with the effects of the debilitating issue. I have spoken to those suffering and those on the periphery. I have heard stories of bright, young, brilliant members of our area who have become paranoid, anxious and fragile, often needing support and care far into their adult years.

As a former teacher, I know that the debilitating effects of anxiety and depression are all too prevalent amongst our young people. The effect it has on their social, emotional and educational development, which are all so important, is monumental. However, it is a problem that the New South Wales Government is determined to focus on, despite the neglect of the previous Coalition Government. This Government is committed to doing all it can to better support the mental health of people all over New South Wales.

Upon coming into government, the Minister acted immediately, commissioning a gaps analysis as an initial step to understand the size of the problem and prioritise immediate actions. The motion acknowledges the Government's commitment to taking meaningful action to support the mental health of the people of New South Wales. This year's budget saw an investment of \$2.9 billion towards mental health services in New South Wales, the largest on record. It includes a new investment of \$111.8 million, including boosting community mental health services. Those services are often the first line of defence in supporting those who are suffering. There is also the Single Front Door Program, delivered through Healthdirect, which provides access to virtual GP services, specialist virtual paediatric services via virtualKIDS and urgent care services.

The Government is aware that the priority must always be frontline professionals. The recent budget also saw investment in 35 senior mental health clinicians added to existing teams located in key areas across New South Wales, enabling the Government to enhance services in localities and communities that need them the most, including three full-time senior mental health clinicians in south-west Sydney. While the Government has confidence in the State's services, frontline clinicians and quality assurance mechanisms, it is clear that there is need for improvement in the system and much more work to be done. The Government is aware that those improvements are just the beginning and vows to continue to work on this serious issue. It is needed to ensure that the system is consumer centred, recovery oriented, trauma informed, culturally responsive, and built with and for the community. For anyone who is struggling, please do not forget to talk to someone. They can call the Mental Health Line, Beyond Blue, Kids Helpline or any of the specialised services designed to catch them in a crisis. That includes carers, family members and friends. They are not alone. The Government is with them, hears them and sees them. I support the motion.

Ms JANELLE SAFFIN (Lismore) (10:48): I speak in support of the motion moved by the member for Parramatta. The motion says that two in five Australians aged 16 to 85 are estimated have experienced a mental health disorder in their lifetime. In speaking about suicide, suicide impacts families forever. When families experience it, it never leaves them. I note that people in the Lismore electorate, whom I represent, talk to me about those issues and where they have experienced it. It is awful. We can only imagine the anguish felt by people who believe that they have to commit suicide. Suicide has touched my family, so I know what that is like. Luckily, the person in my family is still alive, but that does not always happen. I know that every member in this place will support this notice of motion because we all care about this matter. We all want to do better in the area of mental health.

I recently read a Coroner's report regarding someone who had committed suicide in my home town of Lismore. The report showed all of the attempts that the person made to get the right support. From my experience and observations, I believe that we must change attitudes towards mental health and how we respond to it. There are a couple of issues around that. One is that mental health is very much individualised and treated as an individual illness or disorder, when really it is a huge public health issue. Studies that I have read from Johns Hopkins University indicate that by 2030 mental health will be the biggest global public health issue, and yet we still do not respond to it in a big public health way. We have some way to go. The Government has done some terrific work on it, but we need a lot more to happen.

While I was reading the Coroner's report, I noticed words like "malingerer" and "self-indulgent". Those words are commonly used in connection with mental health as though the person is choosing to be like that while in a state of psychosis. But those words and mental health do not go together. Coronial reports are not easy reads, but members should all read them to get a better handle on how we respond to suicide or people who say that they are going to commit suicide. Often those people are not believed or their words are seen as a threat or as being dramatic, but we have to take it seriously. When working with people who have said things like that, my response has been to be really frank and say, "Please, don't do it. We couldn't live without you." We need a wholesale change in attitude towards mental health and how we respond to it. I commend the motion. Every time we talk about mental health we come closer to providing better care for people.

Ms KOBI SHETTY (Balmain) (10:52): I thank the member for Parramatta for bringing the motion to the House. This is a very important issue and I am pleased to be discussing it today. I speak briefly about the mental health inquiry chaired by my colleague Dr Amanda Cohn in the other place to highlight some of its findings. While I commend the motion, it is really critical that we talk about the need for increased funding to support mental health services. That mental health inquiry resulted in several recommendations. It has been promising to see some movement, but it has become quite clear that significantly more money needs to be invested in mental health. We know that it is a huge crisis.

A young 43-year-old man called Jesse Deacon was living in public housing in my electorate of Balmain. Jesse was self-harming and living in real anguish. His well-meaning neighbour called 000 to ask for an ambulance but, rather than an ambulance, the police arrived. They forcibly entered Jesse's home and he was shot and killed. I acknowledge the pain and suffering felt by the Glebe community and by Jesse and his family. His mother, Judy

Deacon, has been a significant voice in the call for more support services for mental health. I back the findings of that mental health inquiry chaired by my colleague that noted the desperate need for first responders to mental health emergencies to be people with backgrounds in mental health rather than police. It is incredibly important that we continue to do a great deal of work in this space because police should not be arriving at mental health emergencies when they are not equipped to understand or deal with mental health conditions.

New South Wales police were deployed to 64,000 mental health-related incidents in 2022 alone. Police Force Deputy Commissioner David Hudson has been quoted as saying that for many of those incidents police should not have attended. Over the past five years, 43 per cent of critical incidents involving a police officer that resulted in the death of or serious injury to a person also involved an interaction with a person in a mental health crisis. We know that 52 people experiencing mental health distress died in interactions with New South Wales police during the past five years, and that includes Jesse Deacon. It is terribly sad to see that continue to happen. I know that all members across the Chamber want to see action in this space and more investment in mental health support, particularly in response to issues where police are called.

The inquiry demonstrated that New South Wales can do a great deal to change its approach. Other States are dealing with mental health crises in different ways. A mental health-led response that results in better outcomes for the people involved—the patients, the families and also the workers—can be implemented. It is critical that police do not turn up to situations that they are not equipped for. I thank Judy Deacon, who has been a powerful voice in a time of grief after the event in which she lost her son, Jesse. She has been speaking out and doing everything she can to highlight the need for a different response. Judy said:

... crisis mental health response programs exist that don't involve police, but are underfunded. The Western Sydney Health Model Teams respond to acute distress of community members without police involvement. The South Australian core model allows Triple Zero calls to be referred to mental health clinician and paramedic, not police.

We would really like to see those changes happen in New South Wales as well.

Ms CHARISHMA KALIYANDA (Liverpool) (10:56): Like many of my colleagues, I am pleased to support the motion moved by my colleague the member for Parramatta. As other members have outlined, suicide and mental illness impact all of our communities, and Liverpool is no different. Indeed, despite the growing discussion about mental health and wellbeing in our community, stigma remains and barriers to accessing care can be insurmountable for many, particularly the most vulnerable in our communities, including those of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander backgrounds or culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds and people in suburban, regional or rural areas, amongst others.

As a former mental health worker myself, I was disappointed that the member for Hawkesbury politicised what should be a shared goal to deliver the mental health services and supports that all of our communities are crying out for. To give members some context about my work within the mental health system, I worked for two years as a telephone crisis supporter for Lifeline. So many of the people who called the service were looking for connection, somewhere to find hope and somewhere to find resources and assistance. The New South Wales branch of the Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Psychiatrists made a submission to the New South Wales inquiry into the current and future provision of health services in the south-west Sydney growth region. It stated:

... it is critically important health services including those for people with mental health conditions, are well-planned and established long-before populations reach their limit.

...

In our view, the mental health system has not benefitted from consistent, integrated and sophisticated service planning ...

That was back in 2020, when the needs of our community in the south-west were growing. That is why it is such an important step for the Minns Labor Government to have made an announcement—

TEMPORARY SPEAKER (Ms Stephanie Di Pasqua): The Clerk will stop the clock. There is too much audible conversation in the Chamber. The House is considering a motion about the important topic of mental health and suicide. Members will show the member for Liverpool the respect she deserves during her contribution to debate.

Ms CHARISHMA KALIYANDA: Thank you, Madam Temporary Speaker. That was very generous. That is why it is important to acknowledge the strides that have been made in the most recent budget announcement. The addition of 35 mental health professionals, which will include five outreach mental health housing liaison positions to support care coordination and pathways into housing, is significant because, as the member for Lismore outlined, mental health care occurs in an intersectional way. It is not a matter of putting mental health resources into one box or another; it is important that all parts of our system come together so that

we can address the mental health needs of our community. As a former mental health worker, I can attest to the burnout and the incredible lengths that many staff who work on the front lines will go to in support of their clients.

If we are talking about paying people what they are worth and making sure that the remuneration for those mental health workers is commensurate with the value they provide, the former Government had 12 years to engage in award reform to address pay issues. That was not done, but it is happening now under this Government. That is why I am proud to support this motion, as well as the many other initiatives that the Minister has introduced in this space to make sure this Labor Government puts at the heart of its response the people who are experiencing mental health distress, their carers, the staff who work on the front lines and the system that needs to respond. I commend the motion to the House.

Standing Orders

UNPARLIAMENTARY LANGUAGE

The SPEAKER (11:03): I have made previous statements about the use of offensive or unparliamentary language in this place, and I have made it clear that offensive personal remarks will not be tolerated. In the context of the recommendations of the Broderick report and in consultation with the Standing Orders and Procedure Committee, I am issuing a guideline, pursuant to Standing Order 9 (2), regarding offensive or disorderly words in respect of the application of Standing Order 74 and matters of disorder. The purpose of this guideline is to clarify that offensive words include words that are sexist, racist, homophobic or otherwise exclusionary or discriminatory. We can all agree that such words are beneath the dignity of the House, and this guideline confirms the standard for conduct and language to be observed in this place. It will signal to the broader community the Legislative Assembly's commitment to upholding the standards expected of elected representatives. Therefore, I issue the following guideline, pursuant to Standing Order 9 (2):

Members are not to use language, make gestures, or behave in any way in the Chamber that is sexist, racist, homophobic or otherwise exclusionary or discriminatory. Such conduct may be considered offensive and disorderly, in accordance with Standing Order 74.

Where a Member has used such language, taking into account the context, tone and manner of the Member speaking, the Speaker may intervene and direct the Member to withdraw the remark, resume their seat or discontinue the behaviour concerned.

Under the authority of the relevant Standing Orders, it is the role and responsibility of the Speaker to deal with any such conduct as matters of disorder. Where a Member refuses to comply with a direction of the Speaker, further action may be taken, including directing the removal of the Member from the House under Standing Order 249 or 249A.

I also note that Standing Order 250 (3) provides that a Member may be named by the Speaker for using offensive words, and refusing to withdraw them, with the potential consequence of suspension from the service of the House.

It is my expectation that all members will take personal responsibility to abide by proper standards of debate in this place and that I will not be required to intervene. I thank members for listening to my ruling. I am sure that we will be able to progress in accordance with the intention of the statement.

*Members***JOINT SITTING**

The SPEAKER: I remind members that, pursuant to the message from Her Excellency the Governor concerning a joint sitting in the Legislative Council, the bells will be rung at 2.25 p.m. to allow members to assemble prior to proceeding to the Legislative Council Chamber.

*Question Time***MINISTER FOR SPORT**

Mr MARK SPEAKMAN (Cronulla) (11:07): My question is directed to the Minister for Sport. The Minister spent \$34,000 of taxpayers' money and took a charter flight to Vegas to watch the footy. What does the Minister say to the thousands of sports fans this weekend who cannot use a charter flight and could miss their game because of industrial chaos under this Government?

The SPEAKER: Members will come to order. We are all excited to hear the answer.

Mr STEPHEN KAMPER (Rockdale—Minister for Small Business, Minister for Lands and Property, Minister for Multiculturalism, and Minister for Sport) (11:08): I thank the Leader of the Opposition for his strange question. I went through budget estimates and had questions left, right and centre about the trip to Vegas. I have expressed on many occasions how valuable that trip was in our support of the NRL and in engaging with elements relating to the promotion of our State and events in our stadiums. Now, if there is an industrial relations issue, the Leader of the Opposition should be asking the industrial relations Minister about it. Even during budget estimates, the Opposition was questioning why I spent so little on food while I was there. That is because I paid for it out of my own pocket, unlike those opposite when they were in government. They would be spending \$20,000 or \$30,000 on food and entertainment during their term.

Mr Mark Speakman: Point of order—

The SPEAKER: The Minister will resume his seat. The Leader of the Opposition rises on a point of order.

Mr Mark Speakman: My point of order relates to direct relevance under Standing Order 129. Vegas was the context. This weekend is the issue. Why is the Minister turning a blind eye to industrial chaos like every other Minister in this Government? Why are they closing their eyes to industrial chaos?

The SPEAKER: The Leader of the Opposition will resume his seat. I uphold the point of order. The Minister will be more directly relevant.

Mr STEPHEN KAMPER: The question was about Vegas and the expenditure there, and I have been directly relevant to that.

The SPEAKER: I call the member for Wahroonga to order for the first time. I will have members removed from the Chamber if they continue to interject.

Mr STEPHEN KAMPER: If the Leader of the Opposition has a question of the industrial relations Minister, that is fine. He should direct that question to her. In relation to Vegas, it added value to the State. We on a number of occasions have expressed how valuable it was for the State of New South Wales. The Leader of the Opposition should direct his question to the right Minister on future occasions.

Mr Mark Speakman: Point of order—

The SPEAKER: Minister, have you concluded your answer?

Mr STEPHEN KAMPER: I definitely have.

SOCIAL MEDIA

Mr NATHAN HAGARTY (Leppington) (11:11): My question is addressed to the Premier. Will the Premier please update the House on the New South Wales Government's school mobile ban and the joint Social Media Summit with South Australia?

Mr CHRIS MINNS (Kogarah—Premier) (11:11): That is an important question for the State. As members would know, the New South Wales Government and the South Australian Government are partnering to deliver a two-day Social Media Summit—the first of its kind—to be held in October this year. The New South Wales Government will host it at the International Convention Centre in Sydney on Thursday 10 October and the South Australian Government will host the second day in Adelaide on Friday 11 October. This is important. Members should note that the call on the Government's Have your say survey website for input from parents on

social media in New South Wales attracted a massive 21,204 submissions, which, I have to report, is the largest number of submissions ever received by the Government on any particular Have your say survey.

In addition, I note the Federal Government has made recent announcements about imposing a social media ban for young people in Australia, a much-needed and important step. As the Premier of South Australia has said, it is far better if we can work in concert with other States across jurisdictions so that we can send a message that this needs to change and this is important and that, at the end of the day, this is a global, unregulated experiment on young people and we need to put some guardrails around it. The State Government has also instituted a mobile phone ban in New South Wales schools, led by the education Minister and Deputy Premier. It came into effect on day one, term 4, 2023.

I can report to the House that teachers are suggesting to the Department of Education that there has been a drop in bullying and violent incidents, and an increase in attendance from those who have been repeated truants in New South Wales schools. Teachers have recorded a dramatic increase in learning time, with one Blacktown High School teacher reporting an extra 50 minutes a day to engage with students—a huge turnaround in the classroom, with kids not able to jump on their phones and social media and be distracted. Members would appreciate that a lot of adults, let alone children, find it difficult to concentrate on the task at hand rather than looking at their mobile phones. I note that the member for Hawkesbury had her say about the mobile phone ban in a motion. She said:

The words "institute" and "ban" go beyond my Liberal values of freedom of speech and the right to choose.

Then she said:

We are not living in a communist country.

"Let the kids do what they want. *Lord of the Flies*—it doesn't matter. You can't put in bans." That is ridiculous. But it is also important to note that those kinds of changes in social behaviour do not just extend to children. [*Extension of time*]

We have to combat misinformation. There has been a recent social media post going around. It is misinformation. It says, "Anthony Albanese and his climate tsar Matt Kean want you to stop eating red meat," and there is a picture of Anthony Albanese and Matt Kean. That was shared by the member for Willoughby. He has been sending it around. I know what he has got against Matt Kean. But what has he got against Albo? That is what we want to know. Has he ever tried a veggie burger? For goodness sake, he should not be a snob. We have to combat misinformation. I know that at the moment Donald Trump is saying that there is an attack on family pets. People are eating family pets, eating the family cat. Guess who is worried about that? It is the member for Ryde. Harassment is a major issue as well.

Ms Jenny Leong: Point of order—

The SPEAKER: The Clerk will stop the clock. The member for Newtown rises on a point of order. Members will come to order so that the member for Newtown can be heard.

Ms Jenny Leong: I know that people find it funny and I appreciate the Premier was just making a joke but I note that at the start of this question time, Mr Speaker, you talked to us about issues around racism and sexism. While I absolutely am not suggesting the Premier was doing that, the reference he was making—

The SPEAKER: I will consider the member's point of order in the context of my earlier statement. At this stage I rule that the Premier has not offended against the intention of that statement.

Mr CHRIS MINNS: I am hardly being racist. You can take these things too far. At the end of the day, we have not heard a lot from Jinxy cat, from the member for Ryde.

Ms Jenny Leong: I wanted to repeat what I said because I appreciate I was not at the microphone. I did not accuse the Premier of being racist. I explicitly said that I know the Premier was not doing that. I was saying the Trump quote that people were making jokes about was incredibly racist. I wanted to bring that to your attention, Mr Speaker. I was certainly not suggesting the Premier was doing that at all. It is important to make that point.

The SPEAKER: I thank the member for Newtown for her clarification. There has been no offence against our standing orders.

Mr CHRIS MINNS: I do not think there should be an implication that there was. Harassment on social media is an important issue. I draw the House's attention to the Hon. Wes Fang, MLC. He has made an outrageous post. I am defending the Liberal Party because of his post "Why the New South Wales Liberals do not represent the bush". He has written a long screed. He was typing it out, early in the morning, on his laptop. He said:

If you've ever wondered why the Upper House Nats are as close as we are ...

We have all wondered that. That is an important issue. He says it is because they have to "stand as one" and that they have to fight against NSW Labor, The Greens and often the New South Wales Liberals in order to deliver for their communities. Then he says:

Mark Speakman was clear about how he ... would act when a member of his team behaved in such a manner. Unless he is ... a hypocrite, he has to immediately remove Natalie Ward.

Enough harassment of the Leader of the Opposition.

REGIONAL SCHOOL INFRASTRUCTURE

Mr CLAYTON BARR (Cessnock) (11:18): My question is addressed to the Deputy Premier, and Minister for Education and Early Learning. Will the Deputy Premier update the House on how the Minns Labor Government is ensuring students in regional New South Wales have access to quality school infrastructure and is delivering the upgrades that have been neglected for 12 long years?

Ms PRUE CAR (Londonderry—Deputy Premier, Minister for Education and Early Learning, and Minister for Western Sydney) (11:18): I thank the incredible member for Cessnock for that important question and for not missing the deadline. The member was an excellent educator in regional New South Wales. He is committed to world-class school infrastructure in his electorate. While members opposite talk about nuclear reactors in the Hunter, the member for Cessnock is delivering a new primary school and high school in the Hunter—and that is on top of six public preschools in Cessnock. I remind the House that while in government the Opposition invested absolutely nothing in the electorate of Cessnock in terms of school infrastructure. On the other hand, as I have said time and again in this House, the Government firmly believes that every child, no matter where they live in New South Wales, deserves access to high-quality, fee-free public education.

That is why we are investing \$1.4 billion in rural and regional schools. We are upgrading and building schools across regional New South Wales. We are going to build the schools, like those in Huntley and Medowie, which were promised. Those schools are needed because they are growing communities, and they have always deserved them. Those communities have cried out for a school for years and years. Three weeks ago I was very pleased to go to the beautiful town of Bathurst to make a few big announcements, particularly about the Kelso High Campus of Denison College.

Mr Paul Toole: I did it before you!

Ms PRUE CAR: The member for Bathurst says he did it. The last time I checked, this Government announced it. It took a Labor government to fund that major upgrade at Kelso High Campus. It is a really sore point for the member for Bathurst.

The SPEAKER: Members will come to order.

Ms PRUE CAR: One would think the member would be happy that Kelso High Campus is getting a major upgrade; instead he is whingeing from the sidelines. I give a shout-out to principal Mick Sloan and his wonderful students and staff at the school. We are making a multimillion-dollar investment in multiple upgrades. The member for Bathurst congratulated the Government locally on that work. It would be nice if he took that spirit into this Chamber. At Kelso High School we are removing six demountables. We are very proud of that. There will be four new classrooms and two new student support hubs. At Bathurst High School we are upgrading toilet blocks and installing new accessible toilets. In budget estimates Opposition members like to ask me about toilets, but that basic maintenance was one of the things they neglected when in government. [*Extension of time*]

The Labor Government is proud to be delivering what the former Liberal-Nationals Government failed to deliver in regional New South Wales. We are also upgrading the toilets at Carcoar Public School. I am sure the shadow Minister is happy about that. On the way to Bathurst, together with the member for Blue Mountains, I popped into Katoomba High School. I give a shout-out to principal Tess Devine. We promised a multipurpose hall facility only two years ago. In fact, when the Leader of the Opposition at the time, Chris Minns, went to the school a couple of the students said, "We really need this, Chris." Two years later, that is almost completed. We are very proud of that multipurpose hall facility; we are very proud to be delivering for schools like Katoomba.

At Dapto High School we are finally getting on with the job of delivering the very best covered outdoor learning area in the State. The previous principal, who served for decades at that school, fought for that learning area for years and years. It has taken a Labor government to deliver for that school. I am also proud to report to the House that finally, after years of inaction by the former Government, a site is being investigated and master planning is underway for a new school at Albury-Thurgoona. I know the member for Albury has been talking about this ad nauseam for some time. It was a pity his Government did not make any progress on that.

Finally—the skills Minister is very happy about this—we have announced a new site for a long-awaited high school at Bungendore. A high school will finally be built for that community, who have been waiting for that high school. We are ensuring that that growing community can access high-quality education. We have announced the site; it is on top of a hill. It will be a beautiful high school. Minister Whan fought for that high school and the community deserves it.

HEALTH FUNDING

Ms KELLIE SLOANE (Vaucluse) (11:24): My question is directed to the Minister for Health. Yesterday the Minister said he would not defend Federal Labor on health care "when it is not putting its shoulder to the wheel". If State Labor cannot get Federal Labor to do its job, will the Minister admit that State and Federal Labor are failing the people of New South Wales?

Mr RYAN PARK (Keira—Minister for Health, Minister for Regional Health, and Minister for the Illawarra and the South Coast) (11:24): I thank the member for Vaucluse for her question—they are still waiting to see her at Blacktown Hospital. Let us talk about funding. On a number of occasions the Government has had very robust discussions with the Commonwealth about the future national health funding agreement. I have made it very clear—the member may wish to follow this up—that that deal is not good enough, as it currently stands, for the people of New South Wales. The reason is very simple: New South Wales is doing too much of the heavy lifting in an area that is traditionally—it should be and it is meant to be—funded by the Commonwealth.

I made it clear yesterday, and I will make it clear every day, that the New South Wales Government—through a range of initiatives such as urgent care services, geriatric outreach services, expanding scope of practice, investing huge amounts in the back end of healthdirect—is investing record funding into health. However, whether we like it or not in this country, we have a two-tier funded health system, and none of us are going to change it. When one tier is not doing the heavy lifting—

Ms Kellie Sloane: Point of order: My point of order relates to Standing Order 129, relevance. The Federal and State governments blaming each other does not help New South Wales. How will the Minister address that?

The SPEAKER: There is no point of order. The Minister has been completely and directly relevant to the question.

Mr Ron Hoenig: Point of order: This is the second time the Opposition has infringed Standing Order 131 (9) by making statements while taking points of order. Statements are impermissible. If Opposition members do so again they should be found to be disorderly and removed from the Chamber. They know they cannot do that.

The SPEAKER: That is the first time the member for Vaucluse has done it.

Mr Ron Hoenig: The Leader of the Opposition did it as well.

The SPEAKER: Yes, and he was warned about it yesterday. The Minister has the call.

Mr RYAN PARK: The member for Vaucluse must be careful as a new shadow Minister. We have all been caught out, but there is a thing called *Hansard*. The member was quoted as saying:

It's time for them to step up and deliver real solutions for our hardworking health workers and the patients who rely on them.

However, late last year she said in this place:

Labor was so beholden to its union paymasters that Labor members did not have the stomach to introduce—
wait for it—

a wages cap.

Mr Dugald Saunders: Point of order—

Mr RYAN PARK: A wages cap. My question to the member for Vaucluse is very simple: Is the Opposition bringing back the wages cap? Are you bringing back the wages cap?

The SPEAKER: Order! The Minister will resume his seat.

[*Interruption*]

I call the Minister for Health to order for the first time. That was an egregious breach of the standing orders.

Mr Dugald Saunders: Throw him out!

The SPEAKER: I do not need advice from the member for Dubbo. The member will be called to order or removed from the Chamber if he continues to provide gratuitous advice.

SPECIAL COMMISSION OF INQUIRY INTO LGBTIQ HATE CRIMES

Mr ALEX GREENWICH (Sydney) (11:28): My question is directed to the Minister for Police and Counter-terrorism. For decades the NSW Police Force neglected the murders of gay men like Scott Johnson and other LGBTIQ people. That led to the former Coalition Government establishing a Special Commission of Inquiry into LGBTIQ hate crimes, which reported late last year. Will the Government accept and implement all the recommendations of Justice Sackar's harrowing report?

Ms YASMIN CATLEY (Swansea—Minister for Police and Counter-terrorism, and Minister for the Hunter) (11:29): I thank the member for Sydney for his very important question. He is a visible and proud advocate for his community, and I know that that community has an enduring interest in this issue. Today the New South Wales Government has released its response to the Special Commission of Inquiry into LGBTIQ hate crimes. I am pleased to advise the House that the Government is supporting all 19 recommendations resulting from the inquiry, and I know that that response will be welcomed by all in this House. The special commission of inquiry, which was established in 2022 by the former Government, investigated the manner and cause in all unsolved suspected hate crime deaths that occurred between 1970 and 2010 in New South Wales where the victim was, or was presumed to be, a member of the LGBTIQ community.

I know that people whose loved ones' stories are told in the almost 3,500 pages of the report are watching Parliament today. I know that these stories include some about people who have been let down by those whose job was to keep them safe. These people never wavered in their pursuit of justice—pursuits that have traversed decades and time zones. To these people, to their families and loved ones, and to the LGBTIQ community, who share this collective pain, I apologise on behalf of the New South Wales Government. The NSW Police Force features prominently in the recommendations from the inquiry. I know that the New South Wales police are deeply committed to learning from the past, and they have already made significant progress on work to address recommendations from the inquiry.

The police have established Task Force Atlas to oversee implementation of the recommendations for the Police Force. They have also established the LGBTIQ+ Consultative Committee, which is co-chaired by police and representatives from the LGBTIQ community and has membership from a cross-section of that community's organisations and representatives, along with victims' families and advocates. The consultative committee is an important forum to seek input into the police response to key recommendations, and I know that it will be a very valuable source of advice for the police. [*Extension of time*]

The New South Wales police have commenced the significant task of conducting a systematic review and audit of all unsolved homicide cases from between 1970 and 2010, establishing a taskforce comprising 25 investigators to undertake this important work. I assure the House that each case is being thoroughly and methodically reviewed. The police are keeping a close eye on international developments in forensic capabilities that could assist in the re-examination of exhibits from unsolved homicides. As recommended by the inquiry, the police are engaging with international police jurisdictions and academic experts on their practices relating to unsolved homicides and suspected hate crime murders, including records management and forensic procedures. My hope is that, through the work to address the recommendations from the inquiry, the New South Wales police can give to the families and loved ones the answers they so desperately want.

In 2018 ACON produced the report *In Pursuit of Truth and Justice*, which gave a voice to victims of suspected gay hate motivated murders that occurred in New South Wales from the 1970s to the 1990s. I take this time to particularly acknowledge former ACON CEO Nicolas Parkhill, who recently departed ACON but whose legacy cannot be understated. I thank all New South Wales police officers involved in Task Force Atlas, including Commissioner Karen Webb and Deputy Commissioner Peter Thurtell, for the care and diligence with which they are responding to the inquiry. Under their leadership, the NSW Police Force can move forward side by side with the LGBTIQ+ community in a relationship that pays respect to their history but is not defined by it. I thank the member for Sydney once again.

PATTERN BOOK DESIGN COMPETITION

Mr JASON LI (Strathfield) (11:34): My question is addressed to the Minister for Planning and Public Spaces. Will the Minister update the House on the progress of the Minns Labor Government's pattern book to help redesign Sydney's housing future?

Mr PAUL SCULLY (Wollongong—Minister for Planning and Public Spaces) (11:35): I thank the member for Strathfield for his question. I have spent some time in his electorate, and he introduced me to a number of members of his business community. They understand all too well just how important it is to have enough

housing so they have access to not only good workers but also more customers. As members would know, the New South Wales Government has launched an international pattern book competition to design homes for the future of New South Wales. These are designs for more diverse housing—townhouses, terraces and three- and four-storey apartment buildings. They are the types of homes Sydney relied upon during some of its periods of growth and that we want to make sure have a place in our housing future because they not only provide density but also restore housing choice so people have good opportunities for different stages of housing in different stages of their lives.

While all Government's policies and reforms to deliver more homes are incredibly exciting, the pattern book is the one that has gotten international attention, from Sydney to Hong Kong, London to Perth—New York, New York—from Auckland to Berlin and from Venice to Mumbai. Architects from across the world have jumped at the chance to submit expressions of interest for our pattern book. It is interesting that there seems to be more interest in the future of housing in New South Wales and Sydney from the opposite side of the world than there is from members opposite. We have had more than 200 entries in the design competition—nearly as many as the design competition that delivered us the Opera House, which we all know and love. Some 200 different groups of professional and student architects from around the world want to help design our housing future.

I am pleased to let everyone know that the competition has entered its next exciting phase. Twenty-one teams have been shortlisted for final designs. The shortlist includes 12 architecture firms from Australia, including some from New South Wales, and three international firms, from New Zealand, India and across Europe. The finalists include people who have designed co-housing designs, terrace houses and walk-up apartment developments in the past. The shortlisted finalists have until mid October to submit their final designs. I bet they will not miss the deadline. Then a five-person jury will judge the designs on criteria including liveability, buildability, replicability, cost-effectiveness, sustainability and the ability to meet the needs of both industry and local communities. This process is now really heating up, with the competition's winners to be announced in November. [*Extension of time*]

The most exciting part is the level of interest from homegrown architecture students. After all, who better to design the future of our cities and our suburbs than the people who will actually live in them? It is really exciting that the pattern book will include designs from some of those young students as they seek to shape the city they will inherit. Pattern book home designs have influenced and shaped homes in New South Wales since the earliest days of European settlement. This competition will also help to tackle the housing crisis by providing a fast-track process for the pattern book designs. Critically, the pattern book will have a fast-track process that will provide certainty for builders, owners, renters and communities. It means that, once the designs are finalised, if you pick one of those designs you can be assured of a swift and certain pathway to approval.

We will make it simple enough so that even members opposite will be able to get the application right and in on time. We will make it that simple. It will mean that builders can get moving quickly and will be able to tailor their business models to deliver pattern book homes. It will assure first home buyers, downsizers and renters that they can access well-designed homes by world-leading architects. It will create a pathway for them to build and live in those homes as soon as possible.

The SPEAKER: The member for Hawkesbury will come to order.

Mr PAUL SCULLY: The pattern book will be a template for the diverse homes that New South Wales needs into the future. It is yet another lever that the Government is pulling to help deliver more homes in New South Wales. This Government is about building better homes and better communities, while members of the Opposition work to block new homes at every possible opportunity.

The SPEAKER: I call the member for Port Macquarie to order for the first time.

REGIONAL TRANSPORT SERVICES

Mr DUGALD SAUNDERS (Dubbo) (11:39): My question is directed to the Premier. XPT regional train services in New South Wales have been cut for 11 days with no notice because Steven Miles is rushing through a project in Brisbane ahead of the Queensland State election. Will the Premier pick up the phone and call the Queensland Premier to ask why regional New South Wales citizens are paying the price for his electioneering?

Mr CHRIS MINNS (Kogarah—Premier) (11:40): I will seek information and report back to the House.

BUSHFIRE READINESS

Mrs SALLY QUINNELL (Camden) (11:40): My question is addressed to the Minister for Emergency Services. Will the Minister update the House on how the New South Wales Government is preparing for the start of the bushfire season?

Mr JIHAD DIB (Bankstown—Minister for Customer Service and Digital Government, Minister for Emergency Services, and Minister for Youth Justice) (11:40): I thank the member for Camden, who deals a lot with emergency services and has experienced a series of natural disasters. I give a shout-out to her local RFS crews, who we have spent some time with, and, of course, RFS crews across the State. Today, as all members know, there is a total fire ban across Greater Sydney, the Illawarra and the Shoalhaven. Whilst bushfire season in this State does not officially start until 1 October, we have already had a series of fires, including a couple of weeks ago when we had up to 100 grassfires at one time. Approximately 22 fires are burning at the moment. Our RFS crews are out there and we are doing everything we can to contain those fires. In addition, aerial assets have been deployed, while others are waiting to be deployed at Bankstown Airport and the Albion Park airport. In the lead-up to the bushfire season, we have done everything we can to prepare.

I said at the outset that hazard reduction has been difficult over the past couple of years. I am not stepping away from that. We have had massive events that we could not control, including, obviously, the weather. All members recognise that over the past couple of years the weather pattern and the amount of rain have made it increasingly difficult to undertake burns as part of hazard reduction. We take any opportunity we can, but there are only very small windows. We will continue to do that.

We are still monitoring for La Niña conditions. The outlook from the Bureau of Meteorology is that it may be neutral for storms and fires. That does not mean there will be none of the storms or fires that we have been experiencing for the last little bit. It only means that neither La Niña nor El Niño conditions can be committed to. Spring is usually a time of hazard reduction burns; people will still be able to smell the smoke in the air from them. We will continue those burns. I give a shout-out to the RFS and the other agencies, including the Crown Lands team that has been up there checking our fire trails. We have people from the National Parks and Wildlife Service and Forestry Corporation working with RFS and Fire and Rescue to try to undertake as many hazard reduction burns as possible.

There are other forms of hazard reduction, including mechanical clearing in areas that we cannot get into to undertake burns. There have been burns in the Blue Mountains, northern beaches and south west. We are focusing on areas, including areas west of the divide, where we are concerned because the lowland grassland has been growing so much, as well as areas that were not burned through during the 2019-20 bushfires. [*Extension of time*]

I need all members to help. This weekend is Get Ready Weekend. I want members to share information with their communities and encourage them to go out and visit their local RFS. It could be at the local brigade, local shopping centre or local Bunnings. We want people to visit the RFS, meet their local firefighters and get some tips from them. All the Get Ready Weekend locations for Saturday and Sunday are available on the RFS website. We can all do it together, as we did last summer. We need to get that information out to the community. I remind members once again of the Hazards Near Me app. I sound like a broken record when it comes to the Hazards Near Me app, but it is the one true source of up-to-date information. It gives people the latest information and informs communities if there is a hazard reduction or burn. The RFS and SES can update it all together.

As part of the support provided by this Government, we are also putting in \$10 million of additional funding for mitigation crews so we do not have to rely on only volunteers and other agencies. The Chinook helicopter, which carries up to 10,000 litres of water and retardant, is in the final stages of being converted so it can be used during night flying exercises. The *Marie Bashir* has been overseas. New South Wales is the only State in the nation with a large air tanker. We are doing everything we possibly can, but we need everyone to do their bit. That includes landowners. Members should encourage people to be prepared, which is a shared responsibility. People can start at home by trimming overhanging trees and any shrubs; mowing the grass and removing the cuttings; removing any material that could be burnt around the home; clearing and removing the debris from gutters to prevent ember fires; and preparing a sturdy hose that can reach every part of the house. Together we need to take this seriously. Together we need to get this information out. Together we will be able to face any challenge that comes our way.

PUBLIC TRANSPORT

Ms ROBYN PRESTON (Hawkesbury) (11:45): My question is directed to the Minister for Transport. This morning at a press conference when discussing the metro conversion, the Minister said, "The delays will cost over \$100 million a month." Why is the Minister letting \$100 million a month of taxpayer money go down the drain while she sits back and does nothing?

Ms JO HAYLEN (Summer Hill—Minister for Transport) (11:46): It is disappointing that the member for Hawkesbury has brought selective interpretation to what was a long and clear explanation of what the Government is doing when it comes to the challenge of providing frequent and reliable public transport services and ensuring ongoing, good-faith negotiations with our transport workforce. As Minister for Transport, my

responsibility is to do everything I possibly can to prevent disruption and inconvenience for people on our public transport network so passengers can have a reliable service.

The SPEAKER: I call the member for Terrigal to order for the first time.

Ms JO HAYLEN: As I explained this morning, unfortunately, despite the fact that we have been in long and constructive conversations with the unions over several days and late into the night last night—and I appreciate the spirit that they have brought to the table—we do not have an agreement yet. My door is open and there is still time. Today was the time to tell the travelling public that we do not have an agreement and, therefore, there will be disruptions to services on the weekend and that we will not be able to provide the level of service that was planned.

I was very clear to the union in particular that they should not let their opposition to the metro stand in the way of families getting to the football this weekend, or the people of the south west getting the metro services that they have been promised for years and the taxpayers of New South Wales have already paid billions of dollars for. A delay to that critical construction and conversion period will cost more. Every contract has been let, every bus driver has been hired and every bus is ready to provide services while we convert that line. I have said to the union that we need to make sure there is a way forward. My door is open to work that out. That is always the best way to do it. I note the politicking by member for Hawkesbury of this issue. It is disappointing because ultimately we know that the approach of the previous Government was conflict and not solutions; this Government's approach is to find solutions. The previous Government's approach was conflict and a wages cap.

The SPEAKER: I call the member for Terrigal to order for the second time. I call the member for Wahroonga to order for the second time. I call the member for Tamworth to order for the first time. I call the member for Terrigal to order for the third time.

Ms JO HAYLEN: That wages cap denied this State the essential public transport and other public services, including teachers and nurses, that we need every day. This Government will continue to work constructively to find solutions for the people of New South Wales. The Opposition's policy is another wages cap.

REGIONAL ROAD SAFETY

Ms ANNA WATSON (Shellharbour) (11:49): My question is addressed to the Minister for Regional Transport and Roads. Will the Minister update the House on the action taken by the New South Wales Government to reduce fatalities and serious injuries on our regional roads?

Ms JENNY AITCHISON (Maitland—Minister for Regional Transport and Roads) (11:50): I thank the Parliamentary Secretary for the question. She is a great Parliamentary Secretary and is really passionate about safety in all of its aspects. I will talk about the Government's recent announcement. At *The Daily Telegraph* Bush Summit in Orange the Premier made a key commitment of \$202 million to target and deliver road safety improvements on identified high-risk regional roads to save lives in the bush.

Mr Dugald Saunders: Revenue raising from the regions.

Ms JENNY AITCHISON: I acknowledge the interjection from the member for Dubbo. No, we are spending \$202 million.

Mr Dugald Saunders: You budgeted 70. Where is the other—

The SPEAKER: I call the member for Dubbo to order for the first time.

Ms JENNY AITCHISON: You cannot read the budget. Do not start. It just makes you look like a fool.

Mr Dugald Saunders: Through the Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The member for Dubbo initiated the exchange. He is already on one call to order. He will be directed to leave the Chamber if he continues to interject. The Minister will direct her remarks through the Chair.

Ms JENNY AITCHISON: Round two spans three years, including this year and 2026-27, and projects will receive the funding prioritised as needed by the Centre for Road Safety. That is \$120 million going out the door in the western region, over \$46 million going out in the south of the State and nearly \$15 million in the northern region. They are all regional areas. I see the very happy faces of the members of the real party of the west. Why are we doing this? Because we are the party of the bush. I misspoke on Tuesday when I said the Premier announced this funding in Dubbo. That is because I went to the first Bush Summit that was held there, but the announcement was made in Orange. But it did make me think about Dubbo, and I went back through the vault.

Someone in the Opposition—it could be the member for Dubbo—has been telling a few porky pies. Last week he told 2GB that there was only \$70 million for the Towards Zero Safer Roads Program. It is over three years. The member for Dubbo was wrong. I would expect better from a former Minister. Then the member for Dubbo said the revenue from average speed cameras will fund toll relief. What a lie! Revenue can only go to the Centre for Road Safety. Then he started calling for things like overtaking lanes, rumble strips, barriers and better surfacing. That is what we are doing. That is what the \$202 million is for. How much of that is going into his electorate? His electorate is getting \$47.5 million. Has he told his community about that? Let us look at what he has said about road safety.

The SPEAKER: Members will come to order.

Ms JENNY AITCHISON: Twenty per cent of the funding is not good enough for him. Between 2015 and 2019 he had a different view on road safety. He talked about 60 people who had been killed, very sadly, in Dubbo, and he said— [*Extension of time*]

He said that it "unfortunately places us in the top 10 when it comes to all of New South Wales". I agree. That is why the Government is spending \$47.5 million in the Dubbo electorate. In 2019, the member for Dubbo was telling his Facebook followers, "There's never a safe amount to speed. Say, 'Yeah, nah' to speeding." In 2022 he was a big fan of speed cameras. He told his followers, "Speed cameras play an important role in keeping commuters safe by reducing fatalities across our road network." Average speed cameras have been used in this State since 2009. I wonder what he is saying to the truckies who have been using them since 2009. When the Opposition was in government, they rolled out 23 of the 25 regional speed cameras. It seems like the member for Dubbo wants to change his views. I found an article in the vault showing happier times. I remember when the member for Bathurst was in Cabinet and the member for Dubbo was not. They were happier times.

Mr Dugald Saunders: Point of order: I take my point of order under Standing Order 73. If the Minister wants to bring on a substantive motion and debate it, I am more than happy to do that. If she wants to reflect on my Facebook—

The SPEAKER: The member for Dubbo will resume his seat. The Minister has the call.

Ms JENNY AITCHISON: Mate, I am; it is called legislation. It is in the House. Next week, you and me, let's do it.

The SPEAKER: The Clerk will stop the clock. I call the member for Swansea to order for the first time. The Minister will direct her remarks through the Chair and not address the member for Dubbo directly. The Minister is experienced and she knows that addressing members across the table results in disorder. The Minister has been chastised.

Mr Alister Henskens: Point of order: The Speaker anticipated one of my points of order, which is that the Minister was not directing her comments through the Chair. My other point of order is taken under Standing Order 74. The Minister was being deliberately quarrelsome.

The SPEAKER: My ruling probably encapsulated that. The Minister will now be well behaved.

Ms JENNY AITCHISON: Mr Speaker, I will speak to you so I do not get distracted. It is deliberately quarrelsome when you go out in the media and you lie, and that is what has happened. The member for Dubbo is saying—

Mr Alister Henskens: Point of order: I ask the Minister to withdraw that comment.

Ms JENNY AITCHISON: I withdraw it.

The SPEAKER: The Minister has withdrawn the comment.

Ms JENNY AITCHISON: "Being loose with the truth" is what I should have said. The member for Dubbo wanted to know whether he would be speeding if he had to get to 110 kilometres per hour to overtake someone doing 98 in a 100 zone. There is no such thing as safe speeding, Dugald.

Mr Dugald Saunders: There is. You just won't admit what it is yet.

Ms JENNY AITCHISON: Yeah, nah. You said it yourself, "Yeah, nah."

The SPEAKER: I call the Minister for Regional Transport and Roads to order for the first time.

PUBLIC TRANSPORT

Mr MATT CROSS (Davidson) (11:56): My question is directed to the Minister for Transport. In February 2023 the Minister announced an election commitment, saying, "Labor will review the train timetable to

deliver better train connections." Why is the Minister now planning to cut peak hour train services between Hornsby and Roseville?

Ms JO HAYLEN (Summer Hill—Minister for Transport) (11:56): I thank the member for Davidson for his question. His community has been one of the great beneficiaries of the new city metro. Every day there are more than 400 new services available for his constituents and the constituents across Sydney. Because of our Government's commitment to an integrated public transport system that works as a whole, we have added 375 new bus services. We have seen the incredible success of that in an increase of 7 per cent in people interchanging between bus and metro and an increase of 21 per cent, as of last week, in people interchanging between heavy rail and metro.

Mr Alister Henskens: Point of order: The Minister is talking about the metro. The metro does not run between Hornsby and Roseville. The question was about train services between Hornsby and Roseville, and not about bus services or the metro.

The SPEAKER: I understand the point of order. The question was about transport.

Mr Alister Henskens: No, train services.

The SPEAKER: A train is a form of transport. The Minister is the Minister for Transport, and she is giving a comprehensive answer. I do not uphold the point of order.

Ms JO HAYLEN: As I was saying, it is about an integrated public transport system, and we have seen an increase of up to 21 per cent in people changing between the heavy rail system and the metro system. That is indication of people, one, having confidence to use public transport more often—tick—and, two, people using the system overall. As a great global city, we want people to have end-to-end active and public transport journeys because that is good for them, their families, their wallets and the environment, but it is also good for our road network because it frees up more space. We will not only introduce new services but also make sure we are using the existing services to their maximum potential, including ensuring—

Mr Alister Henskens: Point of order: The Minister has been speaking for two minutes and not a word has been said about cutting peak train services from Hornsby to Roseville, which is what the question was about.

The SPEAKER: I do not uphold the point of order. The Minister is being directly relevant.

Ms JO HAYLEN: He is really quite impatient. I think his impatience indicates that he is not really committed to an integrated public transport system. Members on this side of the House are; they are not. We are so committed, in fact, that we will introduce a series of timetable adjustments over the course of coming years to make sure that more people can catch public transport more often and that will result in more services, not less.

WOMEN'S HEALTH CARE

Ms SONIA HORNER (Wallsend) (11:59): My question is addressed to the Minister for Health, and Minister for Regional Health. Will the Minister update the House on how the New South Wales Government is supporting women's healthcare needs?

Mr RYAN PARK (Keira—Minister for Health, Minister for Regional Health, and Minister for the Illawarra and the South Coast) (11:59): I thank the member for Wallsend for her question and for recently opening in her part of the world one of our menopause hubs, an important health facility. I know she and many other members in this Chamber have advocated for that for a long time. For many years I have been championing accessible healthcare services for women. In Opposition we rolled out a number of significant policies that are now being implemented. For the first time we have record investment in women's health centres. All of us in this Chamber will agree it was very much needed. Women's health has not had an increase in real term funding since the '80s, but now record funding is going to those centres across New South Wales.

For a long time the member for Shellharbour has advocated for a trauma recovery centre in Shellharbour. We invested \$2.5 million in that centre, which opened just recently. We also invested and worked through a policy in Opposition around the McGrath nurses, and we have rolled out an increase of these cancer nurses across New South Wales. That is something near and dear to the hearts of many members in this Chamber and their communities. We also actively supported and participated in the recent birth trauma inquiry. On behalf of the House, I wholeheartedly acknowledge the women who appeared in that enquiry to share very difficult circumstances and experiences going back many years.

As a result of that inquiry, we are now expanding and enhancing midwifery services across New South Wales. Today I can announce we will fund and allocate a \$20,000 sign-on payment to midwives who go to work in eligible areas of rural, regional and remote New South Wales, to help alleviate the critical shortage of midwives in those areas. Those places include Tamworth. I know the member for Tamworth has written to me and raised

this shortage, as has the Australian Medical Association. I was in Tamworth earlier this year and met with Jill from the Nurses and Midwives' Association. She and a team of nurses and midwives made it clear to me that there were challenges in Tamworth. Since then we have worked on this initiative and today we are delighted to announce that type of payment going into recruiting and retaining our midwives. [*Extension of time*]

We are doing much more than that. Obviously we are investing in menopause hubs. These hubs are particularly important because they provide specialised treatment for women experiencing extreme symptoms of menopause. The member for Wallsend advocated to have one of these hubs and it is now a part of the community she represents. These are important initiatives. In the Illawarra and Shoalhaven, as a result of the advocacy of groups like Better Births Illawarra, we are rolling out an expanded midwifery group practice—the gold standard. Recently in Moruya I had the opportunity to speak with a midwife by the name of Chloe. She helped to deliver baby Stephen to mum, Bianca, and dad, Dwayne. She had gone to that community because she wanted to be part of the gold standard of midwifery practice. The delivery of that model is important to us as we rollout the birth trauma inquiry recommendations.

Before I conclude, I acknowledge a woman in NSW Health who has given 40 years service in midwifery, helping to improve birthing and midwifery practices across New South Wales. Deb Matha will retire soon, after 40 years of incredible work and experience. She was instrumental in setting up birthing suites in the State's hospitals. She stayed on board in NSW Health to see through the birth trauma inquiry. She has been working on our blueprint. On behalf of the people of New South Wales and the broader health family, I thank Deb for all she has done for women, children and families across New South Wales.

DOMESTIC AND FAMILY VIOLENCE

Ms KYLIE WILKINSON (East Hills) (12:05): My question is addressed to the Minister for the Prevention of Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault. Will the Minister update the House on the historic steps the Minns Labor Government is taking to prevent domestic and family violence in New South Wales?

Ms JODIE HARRISON (Charlestown—Minister for Women, Minister for Seniors, and Minister for the Prevention of Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault) (12:05): I thank the member for East Hills for her ongoing passionate advocacy in this space. This year has certainly been a difficult year for people experiencing domestic and family violence, for people who work in the sector and, most importantly, for the families of the women and children who have lost their lives in 2024. We have seen too many women and children lost to violence this year. Today the Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research released its most recent quarterly report. That report shows that 15 adult women were victims of domestic violence murder in the year to June 2024. In the 10 years to June 2024, reports of domestic violence related assaults increased by 28.3 per cent. That is up 2.8 per cent a year on average over those 10 years. Disturbingly, reports of sexual assault increased 107.2 per cent over those 10 years. This simply cannot continue. I know that all members in the House feel strongly about this and certainly no-one more than the Government.

Government has spent many years focused on crisis responses and, without doubt, that work is important. We have to support victim survivors as they experience domestic violence and as they choose to leave it and rebuild their lives. They need wraparound support when they escape violence. They must be able to access safe housing and trauma-informed support that will help them recover and rebuild their lives in a future free from abuse. But that focus on crisis alone does very little to bring down the rates of domestic, family and sexual violence we experience in our communities. If we are going to drive down the rates, we have to focus on the drivers of gendered violence and the behaviours and cultures where violence against women is tolerated, and too often condoned. That is why the Minns Labor Government has committed \$38 million to implement the first dedicated primary prevention strategy in New South Wales. This Government serious about addressing domestic, family and sexual violence, including at the very source. [*Extension of time*]

Last Friday I was proud to stand alongside the Premier and the sector peaks—Domestic Violence NSW and Full Stop Australia—and New South Wales Women's Safety Commissioner, Dr Hannah Tonkin, to launch the pathways to prevention strategy, which is our State's first dedicated primary prevention strategy. It sets out the work that we need to do to address the underlying gendered drivers of violence against women. Our strategy is supported by evidence, including the Man Box data. I recommend that any member who is interested look at that. Our strategy is aimed at the drivers of gendered violence and disrupting those drivers, which disturbingly appear to be worsening, particularly among some younger men. The strategy begins where we know change is possible: in our schools, local communities, workplaces and sporting clubs. We know we can change attitudes by getting to places where people live, learn, work, socialise and play. Those organisations drive people's values, cultures and attitudes.

I am working with Minister Car. We will support school and early education teachers and staff to embed evidence into our curriculum and to provide education about respectful relationships and consent. Minister Cotsis

spoke in Parliament yesterday about what the Government is doing to drive down gender-based violence and sexual harassment in workplaces to make them safe. Minister Kamper will work with me to make sure that our sporting clubs have safe and healthy environments. Importantly, we will also work with Aboriginal organisations. I was out in Brewarrina, Walgett and Dubbo with Minister Harris only a couple of weeks ago. We know that community-led programs are better for Aboriginal people, and we want to work with them. I am very pleased to be working inside government on this strategy.

RAIL SERVICES

Ms JENNY LEONG (Newtown) (12:10): My question is directed to the Minister. This week *The Sydney Morning Herald* reported that peak-hour services on the T8 and T1 lines will be slashed by up to four trains an hour at the end of October. Affected stations in the Newtown electorate include St Peters and Erskineville, which are already losing services due to the closure of the T3 Bankstown line for metro construction. Will the Minister confirm how many hourly trains will service St Peters and Erskineville from the end of October and explain why commuters at these stations will have fewer services, despite the expansion of the rail network?

Ms JO HAYLEN (Summer Hill—Minister for Transport) (12:11): I thank the member for Newtown for her question. She is a longstanding advocate for public transport, particularly for the passengers in St Peters and Erskineville. Our Government is in the business of delivering more reliable and more frequent public transport services to the greatest number of people across Sydney as possible. We want people to choose public transport more often. Whether that is in the inner west, the south-west or the north-west across our city, we want to make sure that those options are available to people. Through the introduction of Sydney Metro, we have totally transformed our transport service. It means that there are more services available to people—over 400 services a day on the metro.

As I informed the House earlier, we are seeing greater interchange between metro services and heavy rail services. That is taking pressure off our heavy rail service. In the first couple of weeks of metro operation, we saw not only a 99 per cent level of reliability on metro but also a 99 per cent on-time running result for Sydney Trains. Again, that is an indication of an integrated public transport system working well. As we introduce new parts of infrastructure to our public transport system, we will make adjustments so that it works well. We will not do what those opposite did and introduce one wholesale, massive transport timetable change, like occurred in 2017. It wreaked havoc across the network that communities are still trying adjust to. We will instead work methodically and carefully so that we see the benefits as each of these changes occur—Sydney Metro City and Southwest, then the new Mariyung fleet will come to the north, to the west and to the south. As each of those opportunities are presented, we will be able to adjust the timetable and make it work together.

That will ensure better services for everybody, including people in the inner west. I confirm to the member for Newtown that St Peters and Erskineville stations will temporarily change to the T8 line during the conversion of the T3 Bankstown line to metro, and passengers at St Peters and Erskineville stations will continue to receive direct services from their local station to the CBD all day, via the T8 Airport and South line. As we announce those changes, I will ensure not only that the community has time to adjust, to know where they are going and how to get there, and I will also keep the member for Newtown up to date.

*Motions***MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES**

Debate resumed from an earlier hour.

Ms DONNA DAVIS (Parramatta) (12:17): In reply: I respond to the member contributions that have been made today on this important motion. First, I thank the member for Camden for sharing her experiences in her electorate, where people are struggling with everyday situations of mental health, which does not discriminate on socioeconomic grounds, age, race or any other aspects of life. I also thank the member for Lismore, who has also seen how closely connected mental health is to extreme weather events, with people in her community facing mental health challenges accompanied with the loss of basics that we all expect to have, such as shelter, and the ability to work and have a livelihood. I also acknowledge the member for Balmain for her contribution and for bringing to the attention of the Chamber Jesse Deacon's story, which highlights the need to improve our responses especially when it comes to all-of-government responses in times of crisis. Our Government is focused on crisis mental health responses, and we intend to address that. I also acknowledge the member for Liverpool, who is a former mental health worker. She highlighted the importance of increased funding in this budget, with an investment of \$2.9 billion for services across New South Wales and in her area of south-west Sydney.

I also acknowledge the member for Hawkesbury for her contribution to the debate. However, I highlight that it is disappointing that she politicised such an important issue. Statements from the member such as "the system is broken in New South Wales" and "employees are underpaid" are quite hypocritical from a former Minister in a government that sat on its hands and failed to address any wage demands and, instead, implemented a wages cap. It is appalling, and speaks volumes to the genuine concern of the Opposition, that only one speaker was put forward to speak about what the member for Hawkesbury acknowledged is an important issue right across the State and, indeed, the nation. That is why the Minns Labor Government is taking action.

This year's budget saw an investment of \$2.9 billion towards mental health services—the largest on record—with an increase of \$111.8 million for boosting community mental health services, \$38.9 million for the mental health Single Front Door Program through Healthdirect and enhanced support for mental health consumers with complex needs. Thirty-five senior mental health clinicians will be added to existing teams located in key areas across New South Wales, including Western Sydney, which incorporates my electorate. The Mid North Coast, Murrumbidgee and Southern NSW local health districts will receive funding for two full-time-equivalent community mental health team members, and there will be three in South Western Sydney, Hunter New England and South Eastern Sydney local health districts, as well as Western Sydney.

The Justice Health and Forensic Mental Health Network will have seven full-time equivalents to provide transition support and community follow-up for people. The funding will also include 35 additional mental health professionals to include five outreach mental health housing liaison positions to support care coordination and pathways into housing. The Government is developing legislation for a whole-of-government approach to suicide prevention, recognising that mental health is not always the sole driver of distress leading to suicide. It is only one factor. I acknowledge the work that the New South Wales Government is doing in that space. I commend the motion to the House.

The DEPUTY SPEAKER (Ms Sonia Horner): The question is that the motion be agreed to.

BOWEL CANCER

Mr MATT CROSS (Davidson) (12:22): I move:

That this House:

- (1) Notes that June marks Bowel Cancer Awareness month and that 19 June 2024 marks Red Apple Day.
- (2) Notes bowel cancer is the deadliest cancer for young people aged 25 to 44, and that you can never be too young.
- (3) Recognises those affected by bowel cancer, know that you are not alone and keep hopeful that you can beat this disease.
- (4) Recognises the work and advocacy of Bowel Cancer Australia.

First of all, I thank all members who are present in the Chamber and the people present in the gallery, whom I will expand on further. I thank them for coming early; the House's business has sped up today. I start with lyrics from The Beach Boys from 1966:

God only knows what I'd be without you

The song's inspiration was created through prayer by composer Brian Wilson and his brother Carl. Those lyrics have had added meaning to me since 23 April 2024. On that day I was diagnosed with bowel cancer. In the days following, I was not sure of the stage of the cancer. My mind went to a place of worst-case scenario, and I questioned whether I had only weeks or months to live. Clearly, I was in fear, shock and denial. I turned to prayer and eventually accepted that God has plans for all of us. I then turned to hope and gratitude that, thankfully, I had actually been diagnosed. That would not have been the case without my wife, Gessika. I am not sure that I would have got a diagnosis and been able to live a full life without her. Gessika booked my colonoscopy when my doctor told me to do so. If it were up to me, I can probably 100 per cent guarantee that I would not have had a colonoscopy when I did, and I may not have had one to date. It would have potentially been too late.

Members of this House know that we are always busy and that every single one of us can be fatigued. My only symptom at the time was fatigue. It finally caught my attention when I attempted to donate blood at the Australian Red Cross, which I had been doing since my late teens. I was told at the time that I had low haemoglobin levels, also known as low iron levels. My call to action is that everyone, in particular us very strong men—well, we think we are very strong—if they are not feeling well, should visit their doctor. I feel blessed that it appears that we caught the bowel cancer early; however, my cancer journey is not over. I again thank my wife, Gessika. I love her very much, and God only knows what I'd be without you. That brings me to bowel cancer. Bowel Cancer Australia said it best:

99 per cent of bowel cancer cases can be successfully treated when detected early.

The organisation's logo, which is an apple—I do not have a prop here today—represents an abstract of the human bowel. The small hole in the apple is caused by a worm. If detected early and removed, the worm is unable to continue affecting the apple or the health of the tree. I recognise those in the gallery from Bowel Cancer Australia: CEO Julien Wiggins and his wonderful team, Aimee Palfreeman, Cielomar Cua, Fiona Radford, Michelle Campbell and Stephanie Bansemer-Brown. I also recognise advocates Jessica Kidd, Robbie Barnes, Shelly Barnes, Amy Graham, Adam Kearns, Mehroz Afzal, as well as the chair, Craig Jackson.

Sadly, we have a challenge: Bowel cancer is the deadliest cancer for people aged 25 to 44. One can never be too young. I welcome that testing kits are now available for people aged 45 and over, and I thank the Federal health Minister, the Hon. Mark Butler. But at age 39, I would not have been able to get that test, and that is the same for anyone under the age of 45. I also recognise the Hon. Chris Bowen, who, thanks to the Gut Foundation, hosted a worthwhile lunch with the support of Paul Nicolaou and Nerida Pearson. Chris and I were on the panel, and I pay my respects to Chris's family. He sadly lost his father in recent times. But Chris spoke of hope too—that his father had been diagnosed with bowel cancer and lived for another 15 years. I recognise the Gut Foundation, led by CEO Roy Wakelin-King, AM; and the president and founder, Professor Terry Bolin.

I now recognise those affected by bowel cancer. I want them to know that they are not alone and to keep hopeful that they can beat this disease. I am currently receiving chemotherapy treatment. I am attached to this bottle for two days, so I am looking forward to it coming out tomorrow. It is round eight of 12 rounds. Chemotherapy is not widely understood by the public. Everyone experiences chemo differently. Thankfully, with the treatment that I am getting, I will not lose my hair. The work of the Cancer Council NSW makes the treatment less invasive. I acknowledge Bev, who is a cancer survivor. Every week, she volunteers at St Leonards and helps all of us who are getting treatment. She gives us great support. I also recognise Jacqui Greenfield and Maddi McEnaney for their work. The member for Willoughby and I proudly thanked our nurses, doctors and

medical staff on Daffodil Day with Jacqui and Maddi. It was inspirational, and I know the staff appreciated it. I pay tribute to our health staff, who go well above and beyond, and say a really big thank you.

I now acknowledge the member for Campbelltown. He and I have agreed to establish the Parliamentary Friends of Bowel Cancer. I thank him for his support and encourage all members of this House and the other place to be a part of it. That will be set up in the coming weeks. In 2025 I look forward to having a big Red Apple Day, Daffodil Day and all of the other events that raise awareness for cancer. I also thank all members of this House for their support in this time. It has been encouraging and means the world to me.

Finally, I share the story of an individual who, sadly, passed away from bowel cancer in recent times. Her name is Betty Tudehope. She is the Hon. Damien Tudehope's niece. On Friday, Raddison Blu is hosting a fundraiser in Betty's honour. Betty was diagnosed with bowel cancer in her thirties, just like me, but, sadly, it was stage four. She had her surgery and she underwent chemo. She continued to work throughout her chemo, which is extremely brave. Sadly, Betty passed away recently, but her memory will stay with all of us. I did not get to meet Betty but I look forward to Friday, when I can champion her work to raise awareness. I commend the motion to the House.

The DEPUTY SPEAKER (Ms Sonia Hornery): We hope the member for Davidson makes a full recovery.

Mr GREG WARREN (Campbelltown) (12:29): I am delighted to contribute to debate on the motion. I thank my friend the member for Davidson for bringing this matter before the House so that we can further highlight the important issue of bowel cancer and cancer more broadly. I thank everyone in the gallery for coming today. I am sure they all have very busy lives, but being here is something truly special. I see some familiar faces. It is good to see Gess. Like the member for Davidson said, I look forward to establishing a parliamentary friends group and doing some work in that space to support each other.

I had the pleasure of being a member of the road safety committee with the member for Davidson. He works very hard and is an effective member of that committee. We established a good relationship during that time. He is a new member of Parliament, and I have watched him continue to perform, grow and fit into that role. That is a true and symbolic representation of his passion for his role as a member of Parliament. I commend him for that. Most importantly, I am sure that all my colleagues will join me in wishing him well during his cancer journey. He has four treatments to go. We know that he is tough and strong and will do well. All our thoughts are with the member for Davidson. When we spoke on the phone and he told me about his diagnosis, he could have knocked me over with a feather, given our working relationship and everything he is going through. I know that his lovely wife is with him and will be there the whole way through.

Bowel cancer is the third most common cancer in New South Wales. It is also the second most common cause of cancer death in New South Wales and across the nation. I highlight some frightening statistics. This year in New South Wales it is predicted that there will be 1,751 deaths from bowel cancer. That accounts for just over 11 per cent of all deaths from cancer in New South Wales. It is encouraging to see, though, that the rate of bowel cancer diagnoses and deaths in New South Wales has decreased over the past 10 years. I pay credit to the researchers, physicians, clinicians and governments of all persuasions who have done a lot of work on treatment, preventative treatment and research. It is truly appreciated. No member knows more about that than the member for Davidson. That rate could decrease even further if eligible people participate in the National Bowel Cancer Screening Program.

I know it will come as a surprise to members, but I turned 50 last November. I celebrated my birthday in all the usual ways. I had a cake and went out for dinner and had a few glasses of wine to celebrate being halfway to 100. But I also got a letter in the mail saying that I needed to do bowel cancer screening. I thought, "I'm not doing that. Why would I want to do that?" But it interested me so I did my research and realised how important it is. Members will also be aware, given their commitment to following my Facebook page, that I had a heart check as well. To cut a long story short, turning 50 prompted me to get tested. Whilst not old, I am not getting younger. This is a stage in people's lives, particularly in the lives of men and people with a family history of disease, to get everything checked out. If we do not test now, there will be problems for us in the future. I got myself tested more for my family than for me. I remember my dad saying to me, "I know it's a pain and it's a hindrance and you're busy but, if you are not doing it for yourself, do it for your kids and wife." That is precisely what I did. I am fortunate and blessed that everything came back clear, but that is not the case for many people.

Debating this matter in the House is something small yet significant that we can do as members of Parliament to draw attention to the issue of cancer and bowel cancer. I will highlight that further in the future as I work with the member for Davidson. All members will work together proactively to achieve that. I note that the member for Davidson acknowledged the passing of the Hon. Chris Bowen's father. I express my sympathies to him. I did not know that Chris's dad had passed away, so it was news to me. In New South Wales the rate of bowel

cancer diagnosis for the 20 to 39 years age group has increased since the mid-2000s, while it has steadily declined in the 50 to 79 years age group since 2007. That shows how effective the National Bowel Cancer Screening Program, which started in 2006, has been. In 2021 in New South Wales bowel cancer was the second most common cause of cancer death in the 20 to 39 age group.

Nobody is too young to be diagnosed with bowel cancer. That message is loud and clear. No matter somebody's age, if they notice any symptoms—including more frequent trips to the bathroom, blood in the stool or a change in bowel habits—they must go to their doctor and get tested. Like the member for Davidson pointed out, sometimes it can be too late. It can be a silent disease. Thankfully, our friend the member for Davidson got diagnosed early, but not everyone does. I am delighted that he did. People aged 45 to 49 can now request a kit from the National Cancer Screening Register by going online or calling the helpline or by asking their GP. Over 90 per cent of bowel cancers can be treated successfully if they are detected early, but only half of all bowel cancer cases are detected early. That goes to show the importance of the National Bowel Cancer Screening Program and completing the test when it arrives in the mail, like I did, or of visiting a GP if you experience any symptoms. In conclusion, I commend the member for Davidson and thank him for putting this motion before the House to highlight this important issue.

Ms KELLIE SLOANE (Vaucluse) (12:36): I thank my friend and colleague the member for Davidson for bringing this important motion to the House. This is personally significant to him and it is equally important to all people in New South Wales. The first I heard of the member's diagnosis—the first that many of us heard of it—was when he stood in this place and announced to the House that he had bowel cancer and would be taking some time out for his treatment. Gosh, when you hear news like that, it takes the wind out of you. We all think of someone who has heard that news. Cancer is a formidable opponent. When we hear the c-word, it fills us with dread. I have to say that being in the Chamber today and seeing the member for Davidson standing there with a bottle of chemo around his neck, so full of optimism and determined to advocate for a cause that is so important, while in great spirits and remarkably good health despite the rigorous regime he is going through, I am filled with hope.

The signal that the member for Davidson sends is so powerful. It is something I always knew about him: He is a powerful advocate for his community and the people of Davidson. They see him stand in the Chamber and work through something quite traumatic and life changing for him. They see him advocate for something so important to all of us. The member for Davidson is showing people that, if we heed the warning signs and do something about them, we can work through it and be a force for good. That is what I see in the member today. I acknowledge that and I applaud him for it. I cannot wait for him to come out the other end after the next four rounds of treatment because he will continue to do good and he is a messenger of hope.

All of us in this place know someone who has had cancer. It does not discriminate. There would not be a person in Australia who has not had a story like this. Despite New South Wales being a global leader in cancer care and research, there is so much more to be done. Bowel cancer is Australia's second-biggest cancer killer, and it is the deadliest for young people between the ages of 25 and 44. It can develop without any family history and may show no signs or symptoms. It affects men and women equally. Ninety per cent of bowel cancers can be successfully treated if caught early, and we must increase screenings in New South Wales. We must all individually be vigilant. My local health district of South Eastern Sydney had 2,686 bowel cancer cases from 2017 to 2021, with 832 deaths. In 2022 the participation rate for people aged between 50 and 74 in the New South Wales screening program was only 38 per cent. That tells us something important: We all need to get the message out, and that is what we are doing today. We can do better; we must do better.

The majority of people who do not participate in bowel cancer screening intend to but often say they are too busy, or they do not get around to it. When that fiftieth birthday present is delivered, we must put it in the bathroom next to the toilet and get it done. It is not that hard. The consequences can be so much harder. It will be the best birthday gift that anyone can receive. The gift to our family is getting the test done and either getting peace of mind or catching this dreadful disease early, knowing we can come out the other end. We can all do a Matt Cross—you can get over this, and you can get on with your life with your beautiful wife, Gess. It is important to do the test straightaway because it will save lives. I say to the member, go get 'em! I thank him for his advocacy.

Dr MICHAEL HOLLAND (Bega) (12:41): In 2024 in New South Wales, it is estimated that 33 people will die in New South Wales from bowel cancer every week. Prevention is paramount in disease control. Bowel Cancer Australia encourages people to understand the risk factors for bowel cancer and to make changes to their lifestyle. There are things everyone can do to reduce their risk of bowel cancer. They include not taking up smoking in the first place and quitting smoking, if you are a smoker; drinking alcohol in moderation and maintaining a healthy body weight; eating healthily, avoiding excess processed meats; and being active. This general advice reduces the risk of other cancers and preventable lifestyle diseases generally.

The risk of bowel cancer increases with age, and our risk is greater if we are aged 50 and over. Therefore, this is the target group for screening low-risk, asymptomatic people. Screening for bowel cancer saves lives. There are several cancers—such as breast cancer, cervical cancer and bowel cancer—for which screening has been demonstrated to be a life-saving tool through early detection of the disease and its precursors. Bowel cancer screening is well researched, non-invasive, cheap and widely accepted. Cancers found early are easier to treat and cure. People who are diagnosed with a cancer via screening are almost twice as likely to be diagnosed at an early and more treatable stage. If more people between the ages of 45 and 74 participate in the National Bowel Cancer Screening Program by having a faecal occult blood test every two years, the proportion of cancers detected at the earliest and most curable stage will be dramatically increased.

Unfortunately, participation in the National Bowel Cancer Screening Program is low across Australia. The national participation rate for the 2021-22 period was only 40 per cent, and in New South Wales only 38.7 per cent of people participated. If this participation rate could be increased to 60 per cent, almost 16,000 lives could be saved between 2024 and 2040 in New South Wales alone. Research commissioned by the Cancer Institute NSW investigated why people do not participate in the National Bowel Cancer Screening Program. Barriers include a lack of understanding about the purpose of screening, lack of confidence in completing the test, and embarrassment.

The test is simple and easy to complete in the privacy of our own homes. People from culturally and linguistically diverse communities also have language barriers. The Cancer Institute has a particular focus on increasing screening participation in communities with lower rates of screening and poorer cancer outcomes, including Aboriginal communities and culturally and linguistically diverse communities. Increasing participation in cancer screening among eligible people from Aboriginal communities and multicultural communities is a priority of the NSW Cancer Plan 2022-2027.

In 2024 the Cancer Institute's community education grants program continues to be a key engagement activity with multicultural communities. The grant program provides an opportunity to upskill the bilingual community workforce on the importance of bowel cancer screening and the key messages of early detection. "Helping Mob Live Healthy and Prevent Cancer" is a digital toolkit developed by the Cancer Institute NSW, designed for people working in Aboriginal health. Finally, the most important thing to do for everyone aged between 45 and 74 is participate in the National Bowel Cancer Screening Program every two years when their test arrives in the mail.

Mr ALISTER HENSKENS (Wahroonga) (12:45): I thank my good friend the member for Davidson for his courage and also for the education that he has brought to the community about this important issue. I thank everyone in the public gallery for their work on bowel cancer, which is regrettably a very common form of cancer within our community. However, it is encouraging, not only for the member for Davidson but also for other people who have bowel cancer, that it has a good recovery level relative to other cancers. Today I will share family anecdotes with regard to bowel cancer. People like me, who have a family history of bowel cancer, have an eight times greater chance of getting it than the general population. As the member for Bega has said, prevention is always better than cure. We can make choices in our diet and lifestyle to enhance gut health, which can protect people from bowel cancer.

Early detection is absolutely critical. I have spoken many times about my father in this place, including how he was a member of the Dutch resistance and a war hero. In 1984, when he was only 59 years of age, he contracted bowel cancer. He saw some blood on some toilet paper when he went to the bathroom one day. Unlike most men, he actually acted on it and went straight to his doctor. He was diagnosed with bowel cancer very quickly and underwent surgery very quickly. I was in my second year at university, and we were all incredibly worried about him.

After about a year of having a temporary bag and then having his bowel reattached, he lived for a further 33 years and died at the age of 92½, which I think is an encouraging story to tell. He never would have seen any of his 10 grandchildren if he had not taken that action. He would not have sat in the gallery when I gave my inaugural speech in this place. So many things over those 33 years would not have happened. As the member for Bega made it clear, there is a very low take-up of those bowel testing kits. As someone who has had multiple colonoscopies, I assure members of this House that a bowel testing kit is a much more preferable way of detecting any problems with the bowel, including cancer.

I encourage members of the community to use those bowel testing kits, as perhaps unpleasant as it maybe, as it is much better than the alternative. Bowel cancer attacks the body and the psychology. That is probably true of most cancer survivors. My father said that the fear of getting it back was always great. It is important for people who are recovering from cancer to look after themselves psychologically as well as physically. I congratulate the member for Davidson on bringing the issue forward. We all wish him the very best recovery.

Ms ANNA WATSON (Shellharbour) (12:49): Like every member in this House, I absolutely welcome this motion from the member for Davidson bringing awareness of bowel cancer to this House. Having heard his personal journey and what he has been going through, I thank him for telling his story. It is probably a hard story to tell. As the member for Vaucluse has said today, we all have a story. We all know somebody or we have heard about somebody who has had bowel cancer. I will put my hand up: I received the kit. It sat in my bathroom drawer—I apologise to the member for Bega and the people in the gallery—for 18 months.

A couple of months after that, I had a mammogram done. As I was having the mammogram done, I thought, "Why would I be having the mammogram done and ignoring the bowel cancer kit?" It did not make any sense to me. I went home and I thought, "I'm going to do this test," and I did. Then I badgered my husband into it. I had to ring and order him one because he threw his out and he did not even tell me about it. It went in the bin. So I rang up and got him one and made sure that he got tested. Now we have regular colonoscopies. To me, this issue is about awareness and education. Any good health policy always has fantastic efforts around awareness. Look at the smoking issue, and the sunscreen and melanoma issue. It is up to every MP in this House to make sure that their communities are aware of bowel cancer. It is up to the MLCs in the other place to do the same thing.

As the member for Bega has said, bowel cancer is the third most commonly diagnosed cancer in New South Wales. But it is also the second most common cause of cancer death. Thankfully, the rate of bowel cancer deaths in our State has decreased over 10 years. That is promising. We need to not only hold onto that but also build on it and bring those statistics down. The Australian Government's Department of Health and Aged Care is responsible, as we know, for operating the National Bowel Cancer Screening Program. Every two years when the kits are sent—I am not too sure whether it is done on a birthday or a calendar date.

Mr Matt Cross: It is done on the birthday.

Ms ANNA WATSON: If that is the case, on all of our birthdays and on all of our family members' birthdays, we should say, "Happy birthday," but also add, "Go and get your bowel checked for bowel cancer." That is a pretty simple thing to do. There is so much that we can do if we really think about it and if there is political will in this place—and I think there is. In New South Wales we are delivering localised social marketing and stakeholder engagement. That is very important. Again, it comes back to public education and support to promote the delivery of the National Bowel Cancer Screening Program. I am aware of my time limit, so I will not go on. But I again wish the member for Davidson all the very best in his recovery. He has the support of every member in this place and the other place. I thank him for bringing attention to the issue.

Ms JULIA FINN (Granville) (12:53): By leave: I want to speak briefly about my mother's experience with bowel cancer. She was diagnosed with bowel cancer when she was 70. She had anaemia and the doctor went looking for the cause of her anaemia. It was quite a big shock for her, but her recovery was really good and she is still going at 87. Annoyingly for me, she embraced the direction to not eat food with fibre in it. If you have a large part of your gut cut up, you cannot eat fibre for a short time. She has embraced it for the past 17 years. I do not think that has been great for her.

When I received the envelope in the mail, I also ignored it. I thought, "Oh God, I'm so old that the Government wants my poo." But I finally did the test earlier this year and it actually was not great news. I failed the test and spent months waiting to get an appointment with a specialist and then had the colonoscopy and the gastroscopy. But I was cleared. I had polyps but they were not cancerous. I will now have to go through colonoscopies all the time for the next however many years. I know a few other members also want to make contributions to debate, so I will leave it there.

Ms LIESL TESCH (Gosford) (12:56): By leave: Matt, you are a bloody champion, mate. We love having you here. Your voice is really important. You have hit all of us in a place that we do not expect to be hit in our workplace, which is in the heart. It is really beautiful. I acknowledge you. I would also like to acknowledge the advocacy of Chris Bowen and the impact that this issue has had on people around me. Ross Bowen was a member of my branch of the Labor Party. I pay tribute to Ross, because those of us in the Central Coast stand on his shoulders. I also acknowledge the fantastic Rotary BowelCare Program, which people can jump online to access. East Gosford Rotary has been running that program for Australia for 30 years. Its work on prevention is a credit to it.

Ms SOPHIE COTSIS (Canterbury—Minister for Industrial Relations, and Minister for Work Health and Safety) (12:57): By leave: I too congratulate the member for Davidson and acknowledge the fantastic work he has done to increase awareness of bowel cancer. We wish him all the very best. It is fantastic to see him in the Chamber while he is enduring treatment. As a cancer survivor myself, I know the rigorous, very difficult and devastating process. You will make it. You will get there. Thank you for your message to all of us to get screened. Well done.

Mr MATT CROSS (Davidson) (12:56): In reply: I thank the member for Camden, the member for Vacluse, the member for Bega, the member for Wahroonga, the member for Shellharbour, the member for Granville, the member for Gosford and the member for Canterbury. In particular the member for Canterbury gives me so much inspiration and hope. It is great to see her at the highest levels of government and continuing to make a sensational contribution in survival. In politics the rule is that you must stay on message. I think we did all stay on message today about getting checked, getting the kit, taking the test and getting colonoscopies. The good doctor, the member for Bega, mentioned eating well and not smoking. They are all really key messages. I am glad that everyone echoed that. We all stayed on message. That is pretty good. Finally, I say to all the people in the gallery that it really means a lot that they came. I hope they join us for a cup of tea and coffee afterwards. I commend the motion to the House.

The DEPUTY SPEAKER (Ms Sonia Horner): The question is that the motion be agreed to.

Private Members' Statements

CANTERBURY BANKSTOWN TORCH

Ms KYLIE WILKINSON (East Hills) (15:10): Last month, our local newspaper the *Canterbury Bankstown Torch*, an institution that had served us for over 100 years, published its final edition. The last pages marked the end of a long tradition of local journalism providing consistent, reliable news and information to the people of south-west Sydney. For more than a century, the Torch did not just report on local news and events; it played an active role in shaping our collective understanding of who we are. It gave voice to issues that mattered most to our community, highlighted our achievements and documented the stories that would otherwise go unnoticed.

John Engisch, chairman of Torch Publishing, said that when his grandfather founded the Torch in June 1920, he envisioned it as a voice piece for the community, making small voices larger. For over a century, the Torch fulfilled that vision, acting as a vital link between local residents, government, schools, sporting clubs and organisations. Without publications like the Torch, there is a risk that local issues, often overshadowed by national and international news, will go unreported. Over the years, it covered everything from council decisions to community events, helping residents stay informed and engaged in civic life. The Torch highlighted the positive contributions of individuals and organisations, showcasing acts of kindness, fundraising for charity and the many ways people made a difference, reminding us of the goodness in our community and beyond.

The decline of the Torch is not an isolated event, nor is it unique to our community. It is part of a broader trend with the disappearance of local newspapers across the country. When local newspapers disappear, so does

the infrastructure that supports the local community. Without local reporters keeping a close eye on council meetings, public decisions and other developments in our area, there is a vacuum that can be filled with misinformation and unchecked narratives. This is where the need for trusted sources of information becomes paramount.

As print newspapers fade, people increasingly rely on digital platforms and social media for their news. While these platforms offer convenience, they are not always reliable. The spread of misinformation is a concern, and without the presence of professional journalists who adhere to high standards of accuracy and accountability, it becomes harder for people to distinguish fact from fiction. As an MP, I know that I am subject to a range of reviews, some positive and some not so much. It is part of the job and it keeps me on my toes.

Despite the mixed feedback, the role of local news in our community is vital, providing the information and scrutiny we all depend on. Local journalism holds people and institutions accountable, providing crucial oversight that helps ensure transparency and good governance. The closure of the Torch will affect some members of our community more than others. My office often receives calls from elderly residents asking for information that used to be readily available in the local paper—details about community events and local tradespeople. Not everyone in our community is comfortable navigating the digital world, and for those individuals the loss of the Torch represents a loss of connection.

As we reflect on the closure of the Torch, it is important to recognise the contributions made by its staff, the editors, journalists, photographers and others who worked on the paper over the years, who were dedicated to keeping our community informed. They reported on stories big and small, sporting scores from the week and shone a light on local achievements. The Torch brought attention to issues that affected our daily lives. Local reporters understood the nuances of our community in a way that national or global outlets cannot replicate. We bid farewell to the Torch and acknowledge its role in documenting over a century of our history. The stories it told, the issues it raised and the conversations it sparked have shaped our community. I thank all those who made the Torch what it was.

COOTAMUNDRA ELECTORATE DOMESTIC VIOLENCE SERVICES

Ms STEPH COOKE (Cootamundra) (15:15): Domestic violence is one of the greatest challenges we are facing in our State. Changing attitudes, providing tangible resources to first responders, police and social workers, and identifying those at risk requires us all to stand up where we can to call for meaningful change and support. In rural New South Wales, it is no different. Women in the regions are at greater risk due to social isolation, income disparity and the tyranny of distance. But escaping violence starts with having somewhere else to go, and in the Hilltops region, a local government area [LGA] with the highest levels of domestic violence-related assaults across the south-east LGAs, two organisations are working tirelessly to meet the needs of this community.

Right now, the Young Crisis Accommodation Centre [YCAC] is the only specialised service provider in the entire electorate of Cootamundra, with over 356 cases a year or about a case a day. They are over capacity and fighting hard to find solutions for their clients and communities. Kerri Palmer and her dedicated team help women, families, men and young people from Boorowa, Harden, Cootamundra and Temora, and have done so since 2008. It has been a great privilege to support the work of YCAC since I was elected as the local member for Cootamundra, attending fundraising nights, lobbying for funding and more recently planning a time to experience their pop-up vintage shop with some unforgettable offerings.

YCAC is determined in its mission to support all those who walk through its doors to find safety and be empowered in their chosen goals. But it needs help to provide more housing and more safe havens for those in crisis. Thankfully, a solution is right on its doorstep: Margaret House. Named in honour of Margaret Browne, Margaret House Refuge is comprised of two facilities to accommodate women and children experiencing homelessness or domestic violence. Over the past five years, staff at both organisations have identified an urgent need to expand their housing services to young people, men and families.

Just this week, representatives from Margaret House Refuge and the Young Crisis Accommodation Centre met with Ministers Jackson and Harrison in Parliament House. I was very privileged to join them for that meeting, and I thank both Ministers for taking time to hear from Anna Hays, Alex Dalglish and Kerri Palmer about their proposal to build more emergency accommodation for more women and children escaping domestic violence. In just one year, Margaret House provided more than 700 nights of emergency accommodation to families across the region through YCAC. Imagine how much more could be done with further homes across the Cootamundra electorate. Kerri and the team are pressing on. They have launched fundraising campaigns and continue to work hard on grant applications for their site with development approval that they have already secured for future housing.

We all know there is no time to waste when it comes to providing life-saving assistance to people living on the fringes, and those at Margaret House and YCAC know it more than most. Regional New South Wales faces unique challenges in overcoming housing shortages and domestic violence. How does a woman make her escape when the nearest town is a 20-minute drive away or when the only service provider may be assisting both victim and perpetrator with emergency housing? These are real situations that our frontline workers are managing in growing regional communities with diverse incomes, cultures, needs and opportunities. There is no time to waste on shovel-ready projects like these across the State. It is not hyperbole to say that these housing projects will save lives, protect families and provide young people with an opportunity to thrive and grow.

I am proud to live in a community that is fighting so hard to change the record on family and domestic violence. I thank the volunteer board of Margaret House, the team at YCAC and volunteers for their determination. I will not rest until we see safe, secure housing for women, children, men and young people across the Cootamundra electorate.

SOUTH COAST ELECTORATE SURF RESCUE STATIONS

Ms LIZA BUTLER (South Coast) (15:20): The South Coast is home to some of the most beautiful beaches in the world. The South Coast electorate spans approximately 115 kilometres of coastline and has around 100 beaches, coves and numerous lakes attracting locals and visitors alike. The downside to this is that many of our beaches are remote. With only three surf lifesaving clubs along this long stretch of coastline, it means that the majority of our beaches are not patrolled. Each year far too many people drown off our beaches and rock shelves and in our lakes and waterways. Last year there was a 16 per cent increase in drowning deaths across the country. Every year there are drowning incidents on the remote beaches of the South Coast, and they are traumatic for everyone involved. As we move into the warmer summer months, it is a firm reminder for everyone to be surf safe and water wise when swimming and surfing, especially on the more remote beaches of the South Coast.

Twenty-six per cent of those drownings happen at our beaches and 35 per cent happen in our lakes. Not surprisingly, 55 per cent of all drownings occur in summer and 52 per cent of these tragedies happen more than one kilometre away from a surf lifesaving patrolled area. This is where a couple of dynamic women from Manyana and the Five Villages Community Group come in. They decided that they had to take action to help address these startling drowning statistics in their local area of Manyana and Bendalong, and started an initiative to install three surf rescue stations at Washerwomans Beach, south Inyadda Beach and Manyana Beach to help save lives. Patti Bartlett and Jenny Cleary co-wrote a book called *Five Villages*. It is a wonderful coffee table book, with photos and stories of events and people who have lived in the area over many decades. It is a fabulous book. I have one in my living room and everyone who comes to my house loves to look through the pages. If they are from the South Coast, they usually comment, "I remember when," and a story ensues.

However, I digress. Patti and Jenny donated the entire proceeds from the sale of *Five Villages* to have surf rescue stations installed in the Manyana and Bendalong area. Their slogan "Buy a book, save a life" helped drive the total amount of funds raised to more than \$23,000. Following these first three installations, a holiday house owner from Manyana raised \$8,250 from 10 families to pay for another two rescue stations. The families are regular visitors who love the area and, while they would like to remain anonymous, wished to be part of this amazing community. Another local couple, Lesley and Tim Dunn, donated the entire cost of two more surf rescue stations, which were installed at north Manyana Beach and the northern side of Lake Conjola, taking the number of rescue stations located on beaches in the area to seven.

This is an absolutely amazing and outstanding achievement. Each rescue station contains two rescue tubes and a defibrillator, and there is surf lifesaving approved signage and instructions on each station. The stations are monitored daily and all information is logged on a shared Google document. As Patti said to me, we live in a geographically isolated and unpatrolled beach area with a large influx of visitors, and each year we see people get into difficulty and often drown. Patti and Jenny are now offering to help other local communities in the area produce a historical fundraising book to raise funds for surf rescue stations or other community defibrillators. I thank Patti and Jenny and the wider community of Manyana-Bendalong for this incredible initiative to help save people from drowning or heart attack. I look forward to seeing more of these rescue stations along the South Coast for locals and visitors alike.

CENTRE FOR VOLUNTEERING VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR AWARDS

Ms DONNA DAVIS (Parramatta) (15:24): On Thursday 12 September the Centre for Volunteering 2024 Central Sydney Volunteer of the Year Awards recipients were recognised in a ceremony at Club Parramatta. The Centre for Volunteering is the peak body for volunteering in New South Wales. Part of its charter is to act as a consultancy and a resource to drive and encourage volunteering within the State as it exists to represent, promote and provide support to over two million volunteers and countless organisations. Led by the talented Gemma Rygate, part of the centre's valuable work includes honouring and acknowledging the work of volunteers.

To this end, the volunteer of the year awards recognise our hardworking volunteers who help others by giving back to the community.

Yuna Cho was selected as the Central Sydney Young Volunteer of the Year. It was a pleasure to present the Young Volunteer of the Year Award to Yuna, who has been a passionate advocate for the environment, volunteering at the OceanEarth Foundation, the Jane Goodall Institute with Sydney Zoo, the Merrylands Youth Centre and the Bravehearts Youth Advisory Council. Young people like Yuna display amazing agency, transforming their values into action. At a time when environmental issues are of primary concern to government, industry and community, we need young people like Yuna to step forward and stand up, helping to make a difference and protect our planet's future. I also note her volunteer work with Bravehearts, which involves providing a voice in a complex policy area where young people need to be heard. Yuna lives in the heart of my electorate. We are very proud of her achievements thus far.

Michael Qualey has reached an impressive innings, with almost 50 years of service to the North Sydney District Rugby League Referees' Association. Michael has worked hard to train and mentor referees while also giving up his weekends to manage game days. The lifeblood of community sports clubs are volunteers like Michael who make it possible for players to get on the field and play the game. I have known Michael for several years and recognise his commitment to family, community and the greater good. I congratulate Michael on his well-deserved recognition as the recipient of the Adult Volunteer of the Year Award. I also acknowledge Anthony Tang, who has worked hard to organise programs and events that reflect the incredible diversity of cultures and faiths within our community, such as the Aussie Day Lunch, the Moon Festival and Ryde Lunar New Year. While Anthony resides in Dundas Valley, his work in the Ryde Community Forum coaching soccer and leading science programs plays an important role in building confidence, skills and knowledge among school students.

The Parramatta Mission Meals Plus Volunteer Team was recognised as the Volunteer Team of the Year. There are 185 volunteers who prepare and serve over 1,500 meals per week. That is 80,000 meals a year, along with over 8,000 hampers per year. For half a century, I am sure that close to a few million meals have been served to people from Parramatta and surrounds by Meals Plus and its volunteers. The mission is not only located in the heart of our city; it is the city's heart, providing nourishment, care and compassion to people in need. The Meals Plus team supports those with a high volume of complex and varying needs. Its services go way beyond the basics to also include fortnightly homelessness hubs, where it brings government and community services, a barber and medical services to its car park to provide an incredibly accessible level of support to our most vulnerable residents. I pay tribute to all those volunteers who serve at Meals Plus. In the words of CEO Gemma Rygate:

Whether it's in the local sports club, in health care, education and cultural centres, legal support or emergency response, volunteers are essential for the ongoing health and viability of local communities.

Gemma's words speak to the underlying truth: Volunteers are the lifeblood of our communities. Without people putting up their hands and giving their time and resources, so many needs would go unmet. It is important that we, as elected representatives, take the time to acknowledge those who make things possible in our communities and give meaning to the word "community".

MCPHILLAMYS GOLD PROJECT

Mr PHILIP DONATO (Orange) (15:29): I address the House on a critically important issue and one that strikes at the very heart of my region's future prosperity: the diabolical decision made by the Federal environment Minister to reject the Regis Resources McPhillamys Gold Project proposal for a mine at Kings Plains. It is an issue that cuts to the core not only of the economic livelihood of Blayney and the broader Central West but also the confidence of future investment in Australia's mining industry. The decision to reject the project that had the potential to transform our region raises fundamental questions about the Federal Government's handling of major economic decisions and the message it sends to our local communities and international investors.

The McPhillamys mine as proposed by Regis Resources was expected to generate several hundred jobs. For a town like Blayney, the promise of stable and well-paid employment was a game changer. We are talking about real families, real livelihoods and real opportunities. The mine was projected to contribute significantly to the local economy. But, with the stroke of a pen, that opportunity has been taken away. Mining operations do not benefit just one small town; they stimulate an entire region. Towns like Orange, Bathurst and Cowra would have seen direct benefits. Yet this decision has pulled the rug from beneath them, leaving businesses that had invested on the back of our State's robust planning approval processes missing out. It is hard not to see this rejection as an autocratic decision, made with inadequate consultation with the local community or consideration of the broader economic impacts. The Minister disregarded the Orange local land council's position on this project. The decision is an outright insult to them and mocks our State's robust planning processes.

The Federal Government has a responsibility to uphold environmental standards, and rightly so. However, a rigorous process was undertaken and the authorised Indigenous body gave it the go-ahead after it scrutinised the plan. When decisions like this are made in isolation, ignoring the voices of statutory representative groups and the people who will be most directly impacted, it raises serious concerns. The Minister invoked a section 10 declaration on 13 August 2024. Curiously, I note the Minister's rhetoric has changed in recent times. She has shifted the weight of her decision based on the mine site being "a significant Aboriginal area to be preserved and protected from injury or desecration" to now saying in the Federal Parliament just last week, "The tailings dam cannot be built on the headwaters and springs of the Belubula River."

What evidence did Minister Plibersek rely on for her decision? Did she ever visit the mine site or the local community? Did she meet and speak with the local land council or other legislated authorities regarding the alleged impacts the project would have? Were local voices given a real platform to influence the outcome? Was the economic future of the region given the same weight as the alleged environmental and cultural considerations? We are left with a sense that a Minister who is navigating her own political struggles and prioritising her professional aspirations as the Federal election looms has now imposed her will from above, without regard for the locals who are directly impacted by her decision.

The rejection of the mine is not just a rejection of a project; it feels like a rejection of the future of our local communities and the future of our nation. It is a stark reminder of the disconnect between Canberra and the realities on the ground in regional Australia. The question must be asked: Are we now entering an era where economic development in regional Australia will be stifled in the name of environmentalism? If so, what future is there for projects like McPhillamys? What future is there for mining, agriculture and other industries that rely on the responsible use of our natural resources? Australia is blessed with vast natural resources, and mining is one of the pillars of our economy. But projects like McPhillamys are long-term investments, and they require a stable, predictable regulatory framework. Investors need confidence that they can navigate the approvals process and emerge with a viable project.

The rejection of the McPhillamys mine sends exactly the opposite message. It tells investors that even after years of planning, millions of dollars in feasibility studies and adherence to all the rules and regulations, their project can still be scrapped. Already, we have seen international investors express concerns about the risk of regulatory overreach in Australia's mining sector. The future of investment in mining—and, by extension, the economic future of regions like ours—depends on the confidence investors have in our system. Minister Plibersek's rejection of the McPhillamys mine is not just a local issue. It is a matter of national significance. It represents an arbitrary decision that threatens the economic future of Blayney and the Central West. Indeed, it is a dangerous precedent impacting all of us, regardless of where we live.

NSW GOVERNMENT APOLOGY TO FORGOTTEN AUSTRALIANS AND FORMER CHILD MIGRANTS

NSW GOVERNMENT APOLOGY FOR FORCED ADOPTION PRACTICES

Ms KATE WASHINGTON (Port Stephens—Minister for Families and Communities, and Minister for Disability Inclusion) (15:34): I recognise two important anniversaries where we reflect on dark times in New South Wales' history. These are difficult conversations, but that cannot stop us from being honest and confronting past injustices, because without honesty change is impossible. Today marks the fifteenth anniversary of the New South Wales Government apology to the forgotten Australians— children who grew up in orphanages, children's homes and other institutions last century. Tomorrow marks the twelfth anniversary of the New South Wales Government's apology for its past forced adoption practices. I not only acknowledge those important anniversaries but also take this opportunity to offer my deepest apologies to those people whose lives were turned upside down by former practices of the State. Those impacted come from all corners of our State, including from my electorate of Port Stephens.

I will start with the forgotten Australians. On this date in 2009, at a ceremony at the Royal Botanic Garden Sydney, the then New South Wales Premier, Nathan Rees, apologised to the State's forgotten Australians for the hurt, neglect, abuse and distress experienced by many of the children who grew up in institutional settings and other forms of out-of-home care. Forgotten Australians include members of the Stolen Generations and child migrants, many of whom experienced sexual, physical and psychological abuse when in the care of the State. I acknowledge the profound, lifelong and intergenerational impacts those experiences have had on the lives of the people who grew up in those institutional settings—and on their families.

Children and young people should be able to grow up in safe, loving and nurturing homes with people who love them—not cold, impersonal and dehumanising institutions that robbed many children of that loving home. The trauma of their experiences remains with many forgotten Australians to this day and rings across generations. It serves as a sobering reminder of the harm the State can do when wielding one of its strongest powers: the power

to remove children from their families. Our Government is committed to continue its support for survivors through funding for the forgotten Australians program in New South Wales. While we cannot undo the wrongs of the past, it is important that we listen to and learn from the forgotten Australians so that we do not make the same mistakes again.

On 20 September 2012 in this Parliament, the then Premier the Hon. Barry O'Farrell issued a formal apology for past adoption practices in New South Wales. Forced adoptions led to thousands of women in New South Wales being robbed of their babies. As a mum, I simply cannot imagine what that would have been like and how painful that would be. Those practices were profoundly wrong, and nobody should ever pretend that an apology can take away that pain. Forced adoptions severed connections to family, identity, culture and country, causing untold sadness not only for those affected, but for many in the generations who followed.

Instead of being offered the care and support they deserved, unwed mothers were shunned, stigmatised and deprived of the opportunity to love their children and watch them grow. Many fathers were ignored and excluded from making decisions about their children. Those who were adopted were raised without ever knowing their birth parents. Those practices were inexcusable. Just like for the forgotten Australians, I know that the pain and trauma caused by past forced adoption practices continues to this day. I would like to assure the community that the New South Wales Government will work alongside the Commonwealth and other State and Territory governments to identify opportunities to address the current and changing needs of those impacted by past forced adoption policies and practices. Anniversaries of shameful aspects of our history act as powerful reminders that we need to learn the lessons of the past and never repeat them.

To members of the forgotten Australians and those forcibly adopted, I admire your resilience in the face of so much suffering. You have my support and that of this Government. I can assure you that lessons have been learned. The Minns Labor Government is undertaking significant systemic reform of the child protection system to give kids the future they deserve. We are determined to shape a system that helps more families to stay safely together so that children and young people stay connected to family, culture, community and country. Where that is not possible and we must respond, we want to provide safe, stable and loving homes for vulnerable children. We know it will take a whole-of-government and whole-of-community approach to strengthen families and communities and keep kids safe. On the anniversaries of the formal apologies, as a government and as a Parliament we reflect tonight on the enduring impact of the harmful practices of the past and commit to never repeat them. The forgotten Australians and those who have suffered from forced adoptions will not be forgotten by our Government or this Parliament.

It was an outstanding effort by all, each bringing their own individual colour and cabaret spectacular. It was a special event to watch. Picking the winners was very difficult. There were three winners on the night. The highest fundraiser was Wade O'Shea, who broke the record for Tamworth's highest ever individual fundraising effort, raising an incredible \$57,000. LIVERPOOL ELECTORATE HOUSING

Ms CHARISHMA KALIYANDA (Liverpool) (15:43): In the iconic words of Darryl Kerrigan, "It's not a house. It's a home. A man's home is his castle." Part of that stems from what we call the Great Australian Dream, which is the belief that home ownership can lead to a better life. That is especially true for so many people in Liverpool, who, for a variety of reasons, may be the first in their families to fulfil the Great Australian Dream. I recall recently speaking to my mother about the significance of buying her home. She said, "After coming to Australia and starting a new life from scratch here, having a home of my own was a sign that I had some roots and I could stand on my feet. It made me feel like I'd achieved progress and independence." For many who have scrimped and saved to buy the roof over their head, that is a familiar sentiment.

A recent investigation into practices within the strata management industry conducted by and aired on the ABC's *Four Corners* revealed shocking evidence of questionable charges, phantom fees and suspect deals with contractors, and even situations where the developer retains control over the owners' corporation to avoid responsibility for building rectification works where defects have been identified. Many of the people impacted are ordinary people who see buying into a strata scheme as a way of entering the property market or a way of downsizing and living within their means in a convenient location.

I recently met with a group of owner-residents of 69-73 Elizabeth Drive, Liverpool. Those residents contacted me, concerned about the apparent takeover of their owners' corporation by a strata company. They advised me that it was done without a democratic process or transparent notification to owners of NSW Civil and Administrative Tribunal [NCAT] proceedings. I was initially contacted about the matter last year following issues related to the 2022 annual general meeting [AGM] of the strata management committee that raised issues with the behaviour of the strata management company, including shutting owners out of the 2022 AGM while important motions were dealt with, the use of questionable proxy votes for meetings held in 2021, and the allowance for pre-meeting votes to be cast by the director of Titles Strata Management [TSM].

The situation escalated following what residents tell me is a pattern of anti-democratic behaviour by Titles Strata Management, especially after the events of 19 July 2023. The AGM held on that day was organised by TSM to be held at 3.30 p.m. at its offices in Drummoyne. It was an unusual location choice given that the residents and building are located in Liverpool. It was to be the first strata meeting not held in Liverpool, with others taking place at the building itself or at Club Liverpool. The time of the AGM, on a weekday in the afternoon, while many owners were still at work, acted to disenfranchise residents of the complex. Furthermore, the location, some 50 minutes away from Liverpool, added to the difficulty of access. However, residents organised to take time off work and re-organise caring responsibilities, and more than 50 people attended at TSM's office.

Clearly not expecting the residents to turn up, TSM promptly cancelled the meeting, citing that the location, which TSM itself selected, was not able to accommodate the number of people that arrived. As a result of the cancellation, tempers flared and police were called to the scene. Through negotiation, the meeting was rescheduled to Club Liverpool on 2 August 2023. TSM further delayed the meeting to 8 September 2023. In the intervening weeks, TSM would apply to NCAT for an interim order for the compulsory appointment of a managing agent for the owners' corporation. The owners would lodge an application to set aside the NCAT order on 4 September, which was dismissed as the owners were not a party to the initial proceedings. As a result, owners were denied their right to vote in the AGM.

The NCAT proceedings were undertaken without the knowledge of those living in the building. How that can occur beggars belief. The owners I met with identified a range of grievances, with the most pressing being failure to manage the strata finances transparently and ethically; charging for unknown expenses, an example of that being a \$330 charge imposed every time the building manager, Dino Khoury, was sent a text message after 6.00 p.m., despite his contract not specifying working after hours; failure to perform its duties with duty of care or skill; and intimidation of lot owners with false claims of by-law breaches and fines. The compulsory order is due to expire in December. I share with the House the concerns of the owner-residents that the order will be extended, compounding their anxiety and distress. I call on the NCAT to immediately review the situation and ensure due process, fairness and justice for those residents, who just want to live in their own home in peace.

SURF LIFE SAVING NSW AWARDS OF EXCELLENCE

Mr ADAM CROUCH (Terrigal) (15:48): I recently had the pleasure of attending the annual Surf Life Saving NSW Awards of Excellence night in Sydney on 24 August. It was a great evening, celebrating our wonderful Surf Life Saving clubs and their volunteer members. Those individuals ensure the safety of beachgoers and embody the spirit of community and selflessness, giving up their time to safeguard the lives of

others along our stunning coastline. One of the most heartwarming moments of the night was seeing the Central Coast clubs shine so brightly. In fact, the Central Coast secured six awards in total, a staggering one-quarter of the awards on offer, showcasing the immense talent, dedication and leadership that exists within the region.

A huge and well-deserved congratulations must go to Terrigal Surf Life Saving Club, which had a standout night and truly scooped the pool. The club walked away with the prestigious titles of Club of the Year, Coach of the Year and Masters Athlete of the Year, which is an incredible achievement. To be named New South Wales club of the year for 2024 is a testament to the hard work, passion and commitment of every member of Terrigal Surf Life Saving Club. It is particularly exciting because it marks the first time the club has received that prestigious honour. With its newly renovated clubhouse opening later this year, I have no doubt that this is just the beginning of even greater things to come for Terrigal.

I specifically recognise some of the outstanding individuals who contributed to that success. Ryan Quick, who was named coach of the year, has clearly played a pivotal role in nurturing talent and fostering a sense of teamwork and excellence within the club. I congratulate Ryan on this incredibly well-deserved recognition. Paul Lemmon, who was awarded masters athlete of the year, exemplifies the commitment to fitness, discipline and personal excellence that defines the surf lifesaving movement. Paul's ongoing achievements inspire not just the younger generation but all of us as we strive to stay active and engaged in our communities.

It is also important to note the broader achievements of the Terrigal Surf Life Saving Club. With 274 trained and vigilant patrolling members, the club has been responsible for performing 22 rescues this season. Yet what is truly remarkable is that this number could have been far higher had it not been for the club's proactive approach and its ability to mitigate over 2,000 potentially dangerous situations on the beach. Its vigilance and professionalism have undoubtedly prevented many emergencies from escalating and, for that, we are incredibly grateful.

In addition to the club's outstanding patrolling efforts, Terrigal Surf Life Saving Club has shown great leadership and a strong sense of community engagement. Its efforts to improve governance and inclusivity have been commendable, with members ranging from as young as five to an inspiring 98 years old. The club has also hosted a range of key events, not just for locals but also for the broader region, further cementing its role as a cornerstone of our community. A special mention must go to Richard Green, the club president, whose leadership and vision has been instrumental in guiding the club to such a historic achievement. Richard has rightly acknowledged the countless committed volunteers who have worked tirelessly to achieve this honour, and we all share in that sense of pride and accomplishment.

I congratulate Jackie Sproll from North Avoca Surf Life Saving Club for earning the title of patrol captain of the year and Richard Grimmond of Ocean Beach Surf Life Saving Club for being named trainer of the year. Jackie and Richard exemplify the skills and leadership necessary to keep our beaches safe, and we are incredibly fortunate to have them as part of our community. On this celebratory night, we also witnessed another individual reach the pinnacle of recognition within the surf lifesaving community. Mollie Murphy of Umina Surf Life Saving Club was crowned surf lifesaver of the year. Mollie's extraordinary contribution has earned her not only this esteemed title but also the recent recognition as a Rotary emergency services community award winner. Her dedication and selflessness embody everything that is great about surf lifesaving, and she is a true role model for future generations.

Finally, I acknowledge the professional support and coordination provided by Surf Life Saving Central Coast under the outstanding leadership of President Matt Slattery, who is a former surf lifesaver, Chief Executive Officer Michael Hyslop and the entire team. The success of our Central Coast club is a direct reflection of the incredible support that they provide. The Surf Life Saving NSW Awards of Excellence are a wonderful opportunity for us to come together and celebrate the efforts of these remarkable individuals and clubs. With over 78,000 members across the State, the work of every volunteer is invaluable. To see so many of our Central Coast lifesavers recognised for their commitment is a source of immense pride for our entire region. Once again, I congratulate all the award winners and finalists from the Central Coast. I thank them for their unwavering dedication and for everything they do to keep our beaches safe every season.

ARTSAKH ETHNIC CLEANSING ANNIVERSARY

Dr HUGH McDERMOTT (Prospect) (15:53): A capital city bombed. Enemy tanks on the streets. Amidst chaos and destruction, people flee from their homes carrying their precious belongings on their backs or strapped to the roof of their cars. Children, in tears, flee to save their lives. People leaving their ancestral homeland of 3,000 years. One may have thought that those descriptions of barbarity and human suffering belonged to the past, to the world wars and genocides of last century. Sadly, exactly one year ago today, the world witnessed the

ethnic cleansing of more than 100,000 Armenian Christians from their ancestral homeland. Today marks the first anniversary of the ethnic cleansing of the Republic of Artsakh—an entire nation—of its Indigenous people.

During those dark days only one year ago, I stood with members of the Victorian and New South Wales Parliaments and the Armenian National Committee of Australia as part of the NSW Parliamentary Friends of Armenia delegation to Armenia, and witnessed firsthand over 100,000 Indigenous Armenians being forcibly expelled from their homes as Azerbaijani tanks and troops rolled in and bombs fell in the streets of Stepanakert. The Azeris' plan to rid the region of Artsakh of its Indigenous Armenian population was successful, and now, having ethnically cleansed and occupied Artsakh, their aggressive foreign policy against Armenia continues.

Azerbaijan embarked on a campaign against Artsakh's cultural and religious heritage to remove all physical signs that Armenians ever inhabited this land. Its objective was to erase more than 3,000 years of Armenian history from the map. Churches, cemeteries and schools have been destroyed, while statues and monuments were toppled and broken in an attempt to erase all trace of Armenian civilisation—all confirmed by satellite imagery released by independent monitors. Such a campaign of human and culture erasure and destruction can only be described as genocide. The Azeri regime also continues to illegally detain an unknown number of Armenian hostages and political prisoners, including prisoners of war, civilians and government officials from Artsakh. Among them is Davit Ishkhanyan, former President of the National Assembly of Artsakh, whom I had the privilege of meeting both in Artsakh and in this Parliament.

Today I join the former Australian foreign Minister, Gareth Evans, who wrote to Australian foreign Minister, Penny Wong, calling for more to be done for the release of Artsakh's political prisoners, including former State Minister Ruben Vardanyan and his colleagues. The Azeri regime must be held accountable for such crimes, and that is exactly what this Parliament sought to do when a motion that I led in 2022 received bipartisan support, recognising the independence of the self-determined, democratic Armenian territory of the Republic of Artsakh. Instead, the international community has rewarded Azerbaijan with hosting the upcoming global Climate Change Conference, COP29, in Baku later this year. That conference will be held in the same city in which Armenian political prisoners and hostages are illegally rotting in Azeri prisons. I firmly believe that Australians should not attend the upcoming COP29 conference. Any individual with a shred of integrity or conscience must abstain from the conference this year, lest they lend legitimacy and respect to a criminal regime that is deserving of neither.

On the first anniversary of this terrible invasion of Artsakh, I demand justice for the Armenians. I demand justice for a peace-loving people who respect the rule of law and cherish democracy over tyranny. I demand justice for an Armenian nation that has suffered in defence of their faith and their values over centuries and which has endured and persevered through genocide. The desecration of Armenian religious and cultural sites by Azerbaijan in Artsakh must stop. All Armenian hostages held by Azerbaijan must be released. All Azeri soldiers within the sovereign borders of Armenia must be withdrawn. Only when Azerbaijan allows the people of Artsakh to return to their ancestral homeland should we once again engage in respectful diplomacy. I encourage all Australians to stand with me for the Armenians who have lost their lives and properties, in a firm stance against the Azeri regime. To the Armenians of Artsakh, I say that this Parliament stood with you before and stands with you now. God bless and protect you, your family and the Armenian people.

ARTSAKH ETHNIC CLEANSING ANNIVERSARY

Mr TIM JAMES (Willoughby) (15:58): Today marks one year since the ethnic cleansing of over 100,000 Armenians from their ancestral homeland in the Republic of Artsakh, a brutal event that unfolded due to Azerbaijan's military invasion. This was not merely a conflict or a territorial dispute; it was an orchestrated attempt to erase an entire people, whose ties to Artsakh stretch back for millennia. I acknowledge the member for Prospect and his earlier private member's statement. I respect greatly his remarks. Last year, like the member for Prospect, I co-led a delegation to Armenia. The visit turned into one of the most remarkable yet challenging experiences of my life. What was meant to be a diplomatic and community and business-related mission became a heartbreaking firsthand encounter with the impact of ethnic cleansing.

As we approached the town of Goris, I never thought I would see scenes of families, vehicle after vehicle, fleeing for their lives. These were people forced to abandon their homes and their heritage under the shadow of an aggressive military force. It was one of the hardest days of my life. I met children who had not eaten properly for over nine months due to an Azerbaijani blockade that had starved them of basic necessities. The streets were filled with the displaced, their entire lives packed into cars, as they fled a land their ancestors had inhabited for centuries. I listened to stories of men and women captured, tortured and killed, victims of a violence that seems almost unimaginable in this day and age. Above all, I witnessed firsthand the horrific consequences of ethnic cleansing—the brutal displacement of people who had every right to remain on their ancestral land. Clearly, such an experience deeply affects you. You return home, safe and sound, and yet you carry with you a profound sense of helplessness, wishing you could do more for those still suffering.

Azerbaijan has tried to cleanse its image on the global stage, particularly as it prepares to host COP29 later this year. However, we cannot forget that the same regime responsible for hosting an international summit is also responsible for ethnic cleansing, continued occupation of Armenian land and the jailing of Armenian people. Those prisoners, including democratically elected officials, languish in Azerbaijani jails without any prospect of justice. Meanwhile, Azerbaijan continues to destroy Armenia's Christian and cultural heritage, erasing the very history of the people it has displaced. While Azerbaijan parades as some sort of wannabe leader in global initiatives, its actions in Artsakh and Armenia speak volumes about the true nature of its regime. This is a regime that starved civilians, launched a brutal military assault and continues to occupy internationally recognised Armenian territory. It is crucial for the international community to hold Azerbaijan accountable for its actions.

I urge all my colleagues in both Houses of the New South Wales Parliament to boycott COP29 in Baku, and I call upon all Federal parliamentarians of Australia to refuse attendance at this summit. I understand that Chris Bowen will be attending COP29, and I strongly urge him to reconsider this. His presence would be a direct affront to Australian-Armenians and to the principles of human dignity and international justice. By attending this summit, Chris Bowen would send a message to the world that Australia is willing to overlook the oppressive and dictatorial regime of Azerbaijan. To attend would be to legitimise a regime that has shown utter disregard for human rights.

At the same time, I want to speak of the hope and resilience of the wonderful Armenian people, their culture, their history and, indeed, their future. Amid the devastation, I witnessed incredible strength and support. Families who had lost everything still found the will to carry on, and communities torn apart by violence clung to hope for a better future. But these people need our support. This is not just a regional issue; it is a broader human rights issue. The atrocities committed in Artsakh should compel us all of us to act. I urge the New South Wales Government and all governments in other jurisdictions of our country to support Armenia and Artsakh in their time of need. The ethnic cleansing of Artsakh is a crime that cannot be ignored, and justice must be sought for the people affected and the principles we proclaim to stand for.

Let us not ever forget the over 100,000 people displaced, the lives lost and the culture under threat. We owe it to the Armenian Australian community to demand justice and accountability. This anniversary is a sombre reminder of what has been lost but also a call to action. Today we remember the victims, and we recommit ourselves to seeking justice for the people of Artsakh. Their resilience in the face of unimaginable adversity is a testament to their strength, but they cannot do it alone. We must stand with them and do everything in our power to ensure that their suffering is not in vain. Now is the time for action. Please let us all lend our time and interest to this cause and to the aid efforts underway. Let us work together to bring justice to those who have suffered to help them rebuild and to right this terrible wrong in the modern era. Let them come home to Artsakh. I will continue to stand up for Artsakh and demand justice, today and always.

RIVERSTONE ELECTORATE SCHOOL INFRASTRUCTURE

Mr WARREN KIRBY (Riverstone) (16:03): Prior to entering Parliament, as the vice-president of the North West Business Chamber, I lobbied on behalf of the interests of small businesses in our area. This, in time, opened my eyes to the broader infrastructure concerns—the roads, the transport and the overall service delivery in the area—that the State Government was responsible for and failing to deliver. It was during that time I started becoming aware of just how large of an issue school overpopulation was becoming. To put it into perspective, the Ponds High School celebrates its tenth birthday later this year. This was the last school delivered to our area, 10 years ago, and it is the most overpopulated in the State.

I vividly remember visiting the previous member for Riverstone after mapping out the catchment area of Riverstone High School, with the projected population numbers, and pointing out that the anticipated number of 13- to 18-year-olds who would be living within that catchment by 2036 came to 20,000. His response was, "The catchment area will change with new schools," to which I replied, "It is going to be hard to change the catchment when there is no budget for new schools." That exchange is one of the triggers that brought me to this place. Between the census of 2016 and 2021, Riverstone faced the highest population growth in the State—primarily young families with school-aged children. This growth did not stop in 2021; instead, it accelerated at a rapid rate.

I have made it my priority in my time as the member for Riverstone to spend as much time with teachers and students as I can to try to understand, at a local level, what we as a government need to do to clean up the mess. That was how I learned that, under the former Government, residents living in units were not counted in student projections because it was assumed that people living in units do not have children. This type of false assumption was also noticed by the Minister for Education and Early Learning. As a result, the NSW Department of Education conducted an audit of enrolment growth in the State's schools at the request of the Labor Government. The audit, which covered the period from 2018 to 2023, aimed to analyse student population trends. It revealed significant student population growth in the north-west and south-west growth corridors, which should come as no surprise to parents living in an electorate where almost every public school is significantly over capacity.

The Schofields east region of the Riverstone electorate experienced the most substantial increase, with government school enrolments surging from 1,535 students in 2018 to 4,762 in 2023, exceeding the projected number of students by more than three times. The order of magnitude can only be attributed to either astonishingly bad management by the previous Government or wilful neglect of the thousands of families moving into the area. The number of students in Schofields was so grossly underestimated that the actual number of students in this area is now higher than the number that was predicted for 2041. In fact, three of the top 20 suburbs with the most significant growth were in the Riverstone electorate and another three were in neighbouring suburbs, like Box Hill and Marsden Park.

Ignorance of the crisis in schools was so acute that, despite the rapid student enrolment growth, the former Government sold off multiple school sites in my electorate and replaced them with housing. Riverstone students are crammed into overcrowded classrooms, their playgrounds have been invaded by temporary buildings and their teachers are overburdened. That raises the question: How could such a massive planning failure have been allowed to persist? The former Government's handling of education in the Riverstone electorate can only be described as woeful. The pursuit of rapid housing development, without the necessary infrastructure to support it, blindsided the students and families of Riverstone.

As an indication of our commitment to public education, I am pleased to say the Minns Labor Government is working to bring public education back on track. Under the education Minister's leadership, the New South Wales school system is receiving an historic boost in funding of \$3.6 billion in Western Sydney. A multitude of school upgrades, temporary schools and new fast-tracked schools, permanent teaching positions and teacher salary upgrades are just the first steps to fixing this mess. Work is already underway on eight new schools in the most critical areas, including new public schools for Nirimba Fields, Tallawong, Marsden Park, Box Hill and The Gables, and new high schools for Tallawong/Schofields, Marsden Park and Box Hill. In addition, even more schools are being planned.

Addressing the infrastructure crisis is a complex issue that requires a multifaceted approach. The audit report suggests several actions that can be adopted to address the crisis. Custom school population projections, continually enhancing projection models, engagement with local stakeholders, developing strategic land provisioning strategies and actively monitoring school growth in the area, using Medicare data, are some of the ways forward. The findings in that report paint a clear image of how the State was left when I came into office. Each finding suggested abject failures of the previous administration. Those failures extend beyond the scope of education and speak to the broader issues in my electorate. An overreliance on private developers and abrogation of responsibility have compounding effects across every element of government service delivery.

GOLDMATE LAND ACQUISITION DECISION

Mrs TANYA DAVIES (Badgerys Creek) (16:08): I raise an important issue concerning property acquisition that is unfairly and disastrously impacting many good and honest people. I have been informed by numerous landowners in my electorate of Badgerys Creek—whose properties have been subjected to the land acquisition process and who have attempted to work in good faith with Transport for NSW, the acquiring authority—that the process and offers from Transport for NSW were purposefully delayed for unreasonable time frames in order for Transport for NSW to await an outcome of its case before the Land and Environment Court against Goldmate Property. Transport for NSW subsequently aligned its offers according to the outcome of that case, offers which are now substantially lower than what otherwise would have been provided.

For a government agency to purposefully delay process in order to retrospectively apply the Goldmate decision to offers that should have been settled prior is outrageous and not in line with the principle of good faith. Honest and hardworking people are left to pay the price of unreasonably low offers. I understand that Goldmate lodged an appeal in July of this year, which is expected to take 12 to 18 months to work its way through the system. Irrespective of that, landowners who should have received offers prior to the outcome of the case should not have had the offers process purposefully delayed to their detriment.

For those unaware of the Goldmate decision, section 56 (1) (a) of the just terms Act states that, in determining the market value of land, it is necessary to disregard "any increase or decrease in the value of the land caused by the carrying out of, or the proposal to carry out, the public purpose for which the land was acquired". The Goldmate decision established that the public purpose may be associated with a coordinated cross-government strategy and that there is no requirement to limit the scope of the characterisation of the public purpose by reference to the legislation that gives rise to the authority's acquisition power. As such, it leads that valuations of property turn out to be much lower as the broader purposes are excluded from having an impact on the property's value.

That decision in itself is extraordinarily unfair and, even if it were the correct decision by law, the law would ultimately need changing. Why should property owners not have the benefit of the natural progression of

a region and its infrastructure taken into account when determining the value during compulsory acquisition? I am sure that, when they and others purchase properties on the free market, they pay a market price that takes into account such things as broader access to transport, schools and shopping centres, and the inevitable future infrastructure that will occur with growth and an increasing population and much more. That very increase in valuation is occurring now in my electorate because of the Western Sydney international airport and surrounding aerotropolis, which are under development. Such things are expected. They inevitably flow from the natural growth of a region over time. Yet, when having compulsory acquisition forced upon them, my constituents have to settle for a valuation that excludes things that are part of a wider government strategy. It is outrageous and totally unfair.

I put on record that one such family actually came to a settled agreement with a New South Wales government department at the end of last year. Both parties settled on an agreed value for government to purchase the land. But despite the family contacting the department for months, it would not pay out that money. It was dead silent until the day after the Goldmate case decision was handed down—when that department picked up the phone, called my constituent and offered them less than 50 per cent of what it had originally agreed to pay only five months before. Irrespective of the precedent established in the Goldmate ruling, it should not be retrospectively applied to create a lower valuation for property owners who should have had their valuations that were agreed to prior to the decision honoured. I call on Transport for NSW and the New South Wales Government to immediately correct this wrongdoing and provide those individuals the reasonable offers they are entitled to.

KIDSPRESS SCHOOL PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

Mr EDMOND ATALLA (Mount Druitt) (16:13): I recently had the pleasure of meeting with members from KidsXpress, a registered charity and leading specialist in children's mental health. KidsXpress was established in 2005. It provides trauma-focused expressive therapy and education services to children aged 12 and below as well as their caregivers. Since its opening, KidsXpress has provided free therapy services to more than 4,000 children who would have otherwise struggled to access appropriate mental health care. The School Partnership Program is an initiative designed by KidsXpress intended to address the urgent mental health needs of children, particularly in disadvantaged communities. The program works by embedding trauma-informed therapists and consultants within schools for up to three to five years.

Currently, KidsXpress is delivering the School Partnership Program in over five schools in the State, one of which is Bidwill Public School, located within my electorate. In the first half of this year alone, the program has seen 170 children between the ages of four and 12 receive support through expressive therapy delivered both individually and in group settings. The effectiveness of such interventions has been evaluated rigorously using a globally recognised psychological assessment tool, the Child Outcome Rating Scale. The scale measures changes to personal, family, school and overall wellbeing before and after receiving therapy treatment. The data collected from sites participating in the School Partnership Program through KidsXpress have shown a significant improvement in Child Outcome Rating Scale scores from the perspectives of not only the children but also their parents and educators.

Children in low socio-economic areas are at a higher risk of suffering from mental health problems. Those children face a higher number of stressful life situations such as parental mental illness, financial hardship and family instability. Research shows that over 50 per cent of primary school-aged children in those areas have experienced mental health challenges in the past year. Some 37 per cent of those children have been diagnosed with disorders such as ADHD and anxiety. Despite those staggering figures, 35 per cent of parents do not seek assistance for their children's mental health issues. This is often due to barriers such as social stigma, lack of awareness and limited access to resources.

Having a school-based initiative like the School Partnership Program administered by KidsXpress brings about awareness to this growing issue and helps to break the stigma around mental health problems in our youths. I am honoured to have had the opportunity to meet with KidsXpress and hear about the amazing work that it does for the community. It is imperative that we break the stigma surrounding mental health issues in children and encourage them to seek help when they are struggling to stop the cycle. I look forward to seeing KidsXpress continue to expand its fantastic services.

ENDEAVOUR SPORTS HIGH SCHOOL

Ms ELENI PETINOS (Miranda) (16:17): I acknowledge Endeavour Sports High School located in the Miranda electorate, which recently celebrated its sixtieth birthday. Founded in 1964 as simply Endeavour High School, the school has grown to exemplify excellence in both sport and academics, even nurturing some of our nation's finest athletes. Over the past six decades, Endeavour has expanded not only in enrolments and size but also in its contribution to the sporting success of our country, truly earning its place as one of the most incredible schools in New South Wales. Despite its early successes, it was not until 28 April 1997 that the school was

officially designated New South Wales' third sports high school by then Minister for Education and Training, John Aquilina. At the time Endeavour's sporting program catered to 220 students across 16 sports.

Today nearly 500 students are enrolled in the targeted sports program, the largest among the seven sports high schools in the State. In 2023 Endeavour's standing as an elite sporting institution was further cemented when it was named an Australian Olympic Pathway School, a joint initiative between the State Government and Australian Olympic Committee that opens doors for the next generation of Olympians to advance both academically and athletically. Therefore, it is no coincidence that one of Endeavour's own, Telaya Blacksmith, made us proud by representing Australia and reaching the finals in the 400 metres T20 at this year's Paralympics in Paris—a tremendous feat at just 16 years old. Her achievement is one of many from a school that takes pride in its history of success.

Esteemed alumni such as Craig Stevens, Stacey McManus and Carl Wilson have represented Australia at the highest levels. They remain closely involved with Endeavour, having contributed to its ongoing legacy. What truly sets Endeavour apart is its strong sense of community and inclusivity. In 2010 the school established Endeavour Special Kids With A Disability—or SKWAD, as it is affectionately known—a charity dedicated to raising funds to support students in inclusive education, ensuring they have access to the resources they need to thrive. As the Sutherland shire high school with the largest population of students with special needs, Endeavour's commitment to inclusivity is both vital and inspiring. Recently I was proud to provide funding through the Community Building Partnership program to support Endeavour SKWAD with the construction of shade coverings for students with special needs.

In 2016 the school became the first metropolitan institution in Sydney to introduce a Clontarf academy, which works to improve the education and lives of young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander men. The academy's impact has been profound, leading to increased student attendance and engagement. The success of the program was even acknowledged by royalty, when students and staff were invited to meet the Duke and Duchess of Sussex during their 2018 royal visit. Each year one of the highlights of my end-of-year festivities is visiting Endeavour for the annual Clontarf graduation ceremony. To mark its sixtieth anniversary, Endeavour Sports High School hosted a series of events, beginning with an open day on 7 September. The day was filled with joy and pride as students performed, historical memorabilia was showcased and the school's rich legacy was celebrated.

A special highlight of the morning was a performance by the school band, featuring none other than Murray Cook, one of the school's most beloved non-sporting alumni—known to many as the original Red Wiggle. The celebrations continued with a formal dinner on Thursday 12 September, where an impressive line-up of alumni and guests gathered to honour the school's contributions to sport and beyond. Among the distinguished athletes were former Matilda and Sydney FC captain Teresa Polias, Commonwealth Games gold medallist Simon Cowley, Sydney Kings hall of famer BJ Carter, Beijing Youth Olympics silver medallist Tay Clark and young Socceroo Hayden Matthews, who was school captain in 2022. Endeavour's influence extends beyond the sporting field. The event was graced by esteemed figures such as Walkley Award winning journalist Stephen Long; Dr Pamela Gower, AM, a senior forensic odontologist; and Dr Emmanuel Karantanis, a renowned obstetrician and gynaecologist, showing the wideranging impact of the school's education on its students.

I extend my deepest thanks to all who organised these memorable festivities, especially event coordinators Jess Rigg and Stacey Croft. I also acknowledge principal James Kozlowski for his tireless dedication throughout the year in ensuring the sixtieth anniversary was such a special occasion. When reflecting on the importance of celebrating the school's sixtieth anniversary, Mr Kozlowski emphasised that the events honoured the past, celebrated the present and looked forward to a promising future for the school. He underscored the vital role that public education plays in shaping society. Endeavour Sports High School stands as a shining example of what public education can achieve. I thank the entire Endeavour Sports High School community, including staff, students, alumni and supporters, for making this such a remarkable celebration. I thank them for acknowledging the school's proud history and hope that the next 60 years are just as remarkable.

COERCIVE CONTROL FORUM

Mr STEPHEN BALI (Blacktown) (16:22): Recently I attended a forum called Unmasking Coercive Control: The Hidden Abuse: How to Spot It and How to Stop It?, organised and conducted by Sharmily Nagarsekar and the team at LEAD Professional Development Services, together with Harinder Kaur and her team from the Harman Foundation. Practitioners from across Western Sydney were in attendance. All the speakers provided invaluable insights about deepening the conversation around this critical issue. Melissa Stubbling gave a wonderful welcome to country, including teaching those of us who were present at the forum words from the local Dharug language like "Warami mittigar", or hello and welcome. Author and journalist Jess Hill provided detailed information about and examples of gender-based violence, and the social issues that we must address to meet the challenges posed by domestic violence. Survivor stories from Kyra Quinlivan and

Jasjeet Kaur were particularly inspiring, as those women shared their difficult journeys—and their resilience. They are the voices for the voiceless.

Parliamentary Secretary to the Attorney General the member for Prospect spoke on the Government's legislative program, and Deputy Chief Magistrate of the Local Court, Theo Tsavdaridis, gave practitioners at the forum an insight into what magistrates are looking for and the pressures everyone is under in the court system. The inaugural Women's Safety Commissioner, Dr Hannah Tonkin, spoke about the role, expectations and importance of collaboration with community organisations and women impacted by family and domestic violence. Annabelle Daniel, OAM, founding CEO of Women's Community Shelters and Chair of Domestic Violence NSW, which is the peak body for domestic and family violence associations, also spoke about the need for coordinated effort amongst the practitioners and improvements in the law. Kylie Durett, Tara Hunter and Emily Dale together presented on local challenges and the efforts of Full Stop Australia.

Sergeant Chris Miller from Mount Druitt Police Area Command provided much solace to all those who were present as he discussed police efforts in delivering and supporting victims of domestic violence and the empathy they showed to those families impacted by domestic violence as they try to traverse the challenges of gathering evidence and addressing the other issues at hand. Some two hours later there was a panel discussion, and no-one had left. The presentations and interactions were wonderful opportunities for practitioners to get together to learn from leading practitioners and network over lunch. Once again, I offer my heartfelt thanks for all the hard work undertaken by the Harman Foundation and LEAD. I thank them for allowing me to say a few words at the start of the forum. Together we can make a difference. Together we can end this scourge of domestic and family violence that is destroying so many lives and creating intergenerational trauma.

HENTY MULTIPURPOSE SERVICE

Mr JUSTIN CLANCY (Albury) (16:26): Recently I had the pleasure of visiting the Henty Multipurpose Service [MPS]. Over lunch I spoke with 12 aged-care residents, including lifelong local Ruth Taylor and caring staff such as Tony, who prepared a beautiful meal for us. The MPS provides integrated health and aged-care services, including acute care, subacute care such as respite and palliative care, emergency care, allied health, primary health and community services. It allows seniors like Ruth to remain close to family and friends and receive the ongoing support they need from medical professionals in their later years. The visit highlighted to me the interface that exists between aged care and acute care, which is experiencing increasing difficulties across New South Wales, including in the Albury electorate. As an MP in a border electorate, boundaries and the interface between systems well and truly exercise many of my thoughts. The *2021-22 NSW Intergenerational Report* projected that over the next four decades advances in health care and medicine will see us all living longer. It stated:

Our ageing population will increase demand for both specialist and basic health services. Rising costs, the prevalence of dementia, and the higher support needs associated with ageing create challenges for health service delivery, particularly for people over 80 years of age.

In July, Minister for Health Ryan Park revealed that nearly 1,200 people waiting for aged and disability care were occupying hospital beds across New South Wales, with 700 waiting well past their discharge date. He said:

It's a terrible situation for them and it's a terrible situation for a system under pressure needing those beds. Our hospital system is not designed for people to be staying in there for months on end.

Workforce shortages are impacting residential aged-care facilities, resulting in some beds being left empty to comply with staffing ratios, while a growing number of GPs are choosing not to accept new aged-care patients. Both issues are having a significant impact on the demand experienced in our hospitals. Albury-Wodonga geriatrician Nicholas Sharroc agreed. He said:

There is often lengthy delays in transferring from hospital to aged care, particularly for people with more advanced cognitive impairment and associated behavioural challenges.

Information sharing between the Commonwealth and the States must improve. Giving greater transparency and awareness about patient flow and the availability of beds would also help provide a much better experience for our elderly and their loved ones.

Whilst there are challenges in accessing aged care, other aspects of the system need to be improved. Seventy-four-year-old Albury resident Elizabeth Simpson recently shared with me her frustrations over the breakdown in communication and continuity of care at this interface. Elizabeth's 85-year-old husband, Russell, who has Parkinson's disease and can no longer speak or walk, was rushed from aged care to hospital in early August. On his discharge, information about the heartbreaking choice to start end-of-life care was not shared with his aged-care facility or his GP, nor was information about Russell's ongoing required medication. This resulted in even more upset and stress. At such fragile times ensuring that the highest level of care, dignity and respect is provided to patients like Russell is of the utmost importance.

We must ensure that our older residents have easily understood, streamlined information on healthy ageing, along with timely access to in-home care and support and, when the time is right, quality residential aged-care options that are close to home. Whilst the federally funded aged-care system faces challenges, it is important that families have early conversations about preparing for a time when they may need in-home care and support, including applying for an aged-care assessment, to help with cleaning, installing safety rails or personal care.

Belinda Mead manages the Bolton Clarke Riverwood retirement village in West Albury. She has flagged major delays in such support for the Albury community, saying that many residents are experiencing wait times of up to 12 months before they can get an aged-care assessment for home care or increased assistance or a change in package. With such lengthy waits for an appointment, it is well worth considering preparing an aged-care plan long before it is needed, much like writing a will. Anyone over the age of 65 and any First Nations person over the age of 50 is eligible to apply for an assessment through My Aged Care. In the words of Theodore Roosevelt: "Old age is like everything else. To make a success of it, you've got to start young."

RSL LIFECARE CENTRAL COAST VETERAN AND FAMILY HUB

Mr DAVID HARRIS (Wyong—Minister for Aboriginal Affairs and Treaty, Minister for Gaming and Racing, Minister for Veterans, Minister for Medical Research, and Minister for the Central Coast) (16:31): I had the pleasure of attending the opening of RSL LifeCare's Central Coast Veteran and Family Hub in Wyong last Friday. As Minister for the Central Coast, Minister for Veterans, and member for Wyong, there are a few reasons why I was thrilled to have this hub open. The Central Coast is home to more than 7,600 veterans. It is the LGA with the highest number of veterans in New South Wales in every age category, which we learned from the census in 2021. Importantly, that data enabled the New South Wales Government and RSL LifeCare to work together with the Commonwealth to better plan veteran-related services and provide vital support to the areas that need them. Opening this hub on the coast is a significant step forward in providing crucial support to local veterans and their families.

I acknowledge the Commonwealth Government and, in particular, Emma McBride, the member for Dobell, for providing the funding as part of the Department of Veterans' Affairs' Veteran Wellbeing Grants One-Off Program. I give a big thanks to RSL LifeCare for doing the important work to research and establish a model that is a proven one-stop shop for service delivery. I acknowledge also the efforts of our local RSL sub-branches and Central Coast Council, that worked closely with RSL LifeCare to get this hub up and running.

The hub will offer a wide range of freely available support services to our veterans and their families. This will include financial assistance and employment assistance, educational opportunities, Department of Veterans' Affairs claims and advocacy, and mental health support, which is a key concern for veterans as they transition from the Defence Force. The centre will also host support groups, workshops and social events, encouraging social interaction and community building, which are so crucial to veterans and their loved ones. It will be a safe place where veterans and their families can come together, share experiences and build lasting connections. I look forward to seeing this hub becoming a humming hive of activity.

Activities such as meditation and yoga are available. In fact, I shared in my speech that I will cherish the opportunity to do yoga with the presidents of the Toukley and Wyong RSL sub-branches. Despite their age, I think their flexibility would outdo mine, so I might watch while they do it. But it is an important thing for them to do. I also took the opportunity to acknowledge the work of sub-branches, particularly the welfare officers. I do not know whether members know a lot about what welfare officers in RSL sub-branches do. One of their most important jobs, as well as looking after the members more generally, is visiting them in hospital when they are not well. One of their hardest jobs is attending people's funerals. They make sure that in the funeral services there is a proper acknowledgement of the individuals' sacrifice and their service to their country. They pay homage to their families as well, which is important. They take that job seriously. It is particularly difficult because often they are burying their mates, which is a really hard thing to do.

On the back of the report of the Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide being handed down a week or so ago, I commit to ensuring that we will look at it carefully and, as well as the hubs and services, we will look at other ways in which the State can interact with the Commonwealth to ensure the welfare of veterans. I will be in Canberra tomorrow, meeting with veterans Ministers from around Australia and with the Federal Minister, to talk about that important report. I sincerely thank all our veterans and currently serving members of the Defence Force for their service on behalf of our nation. I particularly thank the families of veterans for supporting their loved ones in their service to our country and for the sacrifices they make to ensure that we have the protections we need. As a nation we owe them a debt of gratitude forever.

DAVIDSON ELECTORATE TRANSPORT INFRASTRUCTURE

Mr MATT CROSS (Davidson) (16:36): I advocate for transport infrastructure within the Davidson electorate local community. In my last update to the House, I spoke about fixing our local Forest Coach Lines bus services. Today I speak about fixing our local train services. On Tuesday morning I was alarmed to read a headline in *The Sydney Morning Herald* entitled "Cuts to peak-hour trains in shake-up of Sydney's rail timetable". The article by Matt O'Sullivan uncovered secret documents from Transport for NSW about the new transport timetable. It has been revealed that the Labor Government will cut four train services on the North Shore line in peak periods between Hornsby and Roseville. I am officially launching a community petition at www.mattcrossmp.com.au that states, "We, the undersigned, express concern about plans that train services on the North Shore line will be reduced by four services per hour in peak times from 20 October 2024 onwards." I encourage all residents to sign it. This is yet another kick in the guts for Sydney's North Shore by the out-of-touch Labor Government.

First, Labor cut \$9.8 million from the Lindfield commuter car parking. Secondly, the Government rezoned Roseville, Lindfield, Killara and Gordon stations for transport oriented development [TOD] with zero consultation and zero funds for new infrastructure. The Davidson electorate includes four of the seven Sydney tier two TODs. Thirdly, our train services have now been cut. Our community needs and deserves world-class public transport, and only the Liberals can deliver it. Today I asked the Minister for Transport a question about the cuts being a clear broken election commitment. On 17 February 2023 she said, "Labor will review the train timetable to deliver better train connections." As expected, the Minister did not provide a relevant response, pivoting to talk about how good the Sydney Metro city line is. I do agree that Sydney Metro is absolutely fantastic, but residents need train services from the upper North Shore to Chatswood to get onto the metro.

In the recent Ku-ring-gai Council elections, the following results were recorded for candidates who were on the record as being against the TODs. In the Gordon ward, former mayor Jennifer Anderson, former deputy mayor Barbara Ward, Councillor Simon Lennon and Sarah Winn received a combined vote of 64 per cent. In the Roseville ward, Mayor Sam Ngai and Councillor Alec Taylor received a combined vote of 87 per cent. I thank those candidates for standing up for our community and putting their values and convictions first. I thank all the candidates for putting themselves forward for election to Ku-ring-gai Council. Standing for election is not easy and takes courage.

Finally, I place on the record how good the Sydney Metro city line is. I have been thinking about the future of transport and what is next for Sydney Metro. As I wrote in an opinion piece in *The Daily Telegraph* on 21 August 2024, "Sydney needs to keep the big transport picture alive." Sydney Metro is an absolutely amazing project. I have been on it several times. To get to Parliament, I catch the train from Lindfield to Chatswood and then walk across the platform to hop on the metro. It is absolutely fantastic. It is so successful that I can no longer do work on the train. When I first hopped on the metro, I thought I was in another country—it was that amazing. I look forward to the metro line expanding to south-west Sydney.

In the coming decades, each section of the Sydney Metro should come together to form a connected loop around Sydney. It should connect Westmead to Western Sydney airport and Bankstown to Glenfield. Passengers will then be able to hop on and off at stations at Chatswood, Central, Bankstown, Leppington, St Marys, Norwest and North Ryde. It should be a big continuous loop around Sydney. That would be an absolute game changer for Sydney. I urge the Government to commit to business cases, particularly for the two lines that I identified. Sadly, it was a Liberal Party election commitment and if we had been elected the business cases would have continued. If that was achieved, my local community could travel from Chatswood all the way out to Western Sydney airport and then connect with the rest of the world. That would be transformational.

I call on Premier Minns to start thinking about his legacy. Does he want to be a small-vision Premier, like his Labor predecessors, or a big-vision Premier, like Gladys Berejiklian, who drove Sydney Metro as transport Minister, Treasurer and Premier? Gladys truly imagined a twenty-first century Sydney and I pay tribute to all the work she did, along with her predecessors Mike Baird and Barry O'Farrell and Treasurer Dominic Perrottet. I thank them for Sydney Metro.

Australian Red Cross runs recovery and preparedness workshops to ensure local communities are better prepared for the next natural disaster. LIVING LAB NORTHERN RIVERS VISITS NSW PARLIAMENT
